Arrested and Charged With Dynamite Outrage at Independence.

Cripple Creek, Colo., July 11.—Pearl Skelton was brought to this city today from Pueblo on a warrant charging him with the murder of the 14 men who were killed by the explosion at Independence station, June 6. Skelton, who left Crimple Creek after the exwho left Cripple Creek after the ex-plosion, was arrested on the Medill ranch, near Rye station, in Pueblo

county. Sheriff Bell said that Skelton had talked a great deal about the explosion, but he did not know what evidence had been obtained to connect him with the crime. Skelton protested his innocence and said that he would have no difficuland said that he would have no difficul-ty in proving an alibi. Upon compfaint sworn out by S. A. Phipps, a direct information was to-day filed in the district court charging Frank Cochran, secretary of the Victor Miners' union, Arthur Parker, Albert Carrington, Thomas McManus, Richard James, John James, Edward McKelvey and Alfred Miller with conspiracy to kill Roscoe McGee, who was shot and Instantly killed in the Victor street fight on June 6. All of these men are now in jail here.

and leaves, Whereas in the first two spring sprayings a coarse nozzle and a heavy Paris Green spray should be used in or-der to strike the cup or calyx of the ap-ple, and put a poison into the calyx that will sink to the bottom of the calyx cup

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
