Eades-Curtis Discussion in the Second Ward Meetinghouse Last Night.

The second session of the debate between J. F. Curtis of the Reorganized church and Jacob A. Eades of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, was held in the Murray Second ward, last evening. The first hour was devoted to the "claim of young Joseph" to be his father's rightful and legal successor, Elder Curtis affirming, and the second hour to the claims of the twelve apostles, with Brigham Young at their head, to the successorship as the presiding quorum of the Church.

Mr. Curtis was the first speaker, af-Mr. Curtis was the first speaker, al-firming the first proposition. After some preliminary remarks he stated that Efder Eades the night previous had declared that Zenas H. Gurley held no priesthood in the original Church, while it was well known that 

#### WHITEHEAD STATEMENT.

His statement is in substance as follows: He recollected a meeting held in Nauvoo in the winter of 1843, at which Joseph Smith appointed his successor. There were present on the stand at the time. Joseph Smith, who did the taiking, Hyrum Smith, who did the taiking, Hyrum Smith, John Taylor, Willard Richards, Ebenezer Robinson, George J. Adams, and oth-ers. On this day, Joseph Smith called his son to the stand and appointed him as his successor. "This must be fulfilled." said he, "for it is a revela-tion, else Joseph Smith is a false prophet." It cannot be fulfilled unless his seed hold the priesthood, and they are all in the Reorganization." The anointing promised in section 124 did not pertain to the boarding house, but to the blessing of birthright conferred on the oldest son. Joseph Smith, Jr., of the Reorganization, said he, was bapfized by his father, and has never belonged to any but the original Church. This was also true of Jason W. Briggs, Zenas H. Gurley and oth-er leaders of the Reorganization, whose priesthood Elder Eades had tried to destroy. They were never baptized but once and were always members of the original Church, and held the priesthood in the days of Jo-seph Smith. HAD NEVER DESCENDED.

HAD NEVER DESCENDED. Elder Eades also quoted many pas-sages from the Doctrine and Covenants providing that the office of president of the high priesthood did not descend from father to son, that it never had so descended. Moses who had sons, chose Joshua the son of Nun and thus it had always been. There are but two offices in the Church that do descend through lineage, those of patriarch and bishop. When Mr. Curtis quoted from section 107, he misconstrued the pas-sage which it is plain to see refers to the order of patriarchs and not the Melchisedek priesthood. That Hyrum Smith received this office from his fath-er by blessing and also by right, and it was the birthright, not the office of president of the Church. Moreover, in that revelation Hyrum Smith was re-moved from the office of counselor in the first presidency and was called to be a prophet, seer and president of the Church conjointly with Joseph Smith, and that he received the keys of the priesthood and blessings of Oliver Cow-dery by which the promise was made that through his seed as well as through the seed of Joseph Smith, all nations, or generations, should be blessed. And the seed of Hyrum Smith were not with the Reorganization. He stated that the presidency of the high priesthood is composed of three high priests who are chosen by the body and if so chosen it cannot be by line-age. (See Doctrine and Covenants, sec-tion 107: 22). TELFER HELD IN OMAHA.

Man Charged With Defrauding Hotel Will be Brought to Trial Here.

When he came to settle his bill, he offered the clerk an express order, purporting to have been issued by the Dominion Express company at Hamilton, Canada, and countersigned by the company's agent at that place. The order was in reg-ular form, duly numbered and made out as such orders usually are, clipped in words and figures for the amount of \$50, and was, in fact, so regular in all respects that the clerk had no hes-itancy in accepting it as payment. He turned the same in to the Wells Fargo Express company here, and nothing further was heard of the matter until Wells Fargo company the other day received a communication from the Dominion company, dated at Toronto, Canada, repudiating the order sent in to them as paid, and advising Wells Fargo to get their money from the hotel company. Telfer, accounting for its regular appearance, and apparent semulences.
