## LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Twenty-second ward M. I. A. will give a leap-year ball tomorrow evening in the ward hall.

William Butts pleaded guilty yesterday afternoon, to gambling and was given 15 days in the city jail. Butts is already serving 100 days' sentence for assault and battery.

The Consolidated Wagon & Machine company will build shortly a ware-house, 140%145 feet, and two stories high at Idaho Falls, corner of Broadway and Capitol avenue,

General Manager G. T. Odell of the Consolidated Wagon & Machine com-pany has returned from a trip through southern Idaho and the northern part of this state. He reports an abundance of water all through that section of country, so that everybody is feeling first rate.

The recent precipitation proved disastrous to the underground conduits of the Bell Telephone company on east South Temple street, as the water ran into the manholes from the hills to such an extent that business was interfered with until the water could be pumped out.

Lieut.-Col. Thomas C. Woodbury of the Third Infantry who will command that regiment on the trip to Panama, was formerly a lieutenant and captain in the Sixteenth Infantry when that command was stationed at Fort Doug-las.
