SANITARY HEATING AND VENTILATING.

1901.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that in the case of the Jackson school the surface water is within six inches of the surface, and that the system of tanks consists of an unusual water accumulation, and recommended that the building be heated and ventilated by the fan system, and that the same system of dry sanitary heating close heat, estimated for water tanks. Total cost of the school \$118. Total cost for one week.

ACTUAL PAYMENT.

GOING ON.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The work of preparing the buildings for the World's Fair is still on way. The police are making strenuous efforts to get possession of all the streets and places them in confinement until after the opening of the fair. A great deal is being done along the lines of the preparation for the establishment of temporary hospital stations, etc.

There is some comment over the announcement that the Illinois State Fair will be held in the World's Fair grounds. This is owing to the fact that no provision was made and no money available to pay the cost of transporting the several regiments of Illinois State Fair to the World's Fair grounds. It is thought that only a portion of the State represented and therefore decline to appear in the parade unless their local comrades are brought in. A committee is being formed for the raising of the necessary amount by subscription.
