BIG FIRE IN OAKLAND.

Oakland, Cal., Sept. 18.—The 15,000 barrel oil tank of the Oakland Gas Light & Heat company, at the foot of Jefferson street, near the Southern Pacific tracks, was destroyed by fire at 6:30 this morning. The fire started from
