LOCAL BRIEFS.

Judge Hall has granted Mrs. Orpha Rocker a divorce from Fred E. Rocker on the grounds of desertion and non-support. They were married at Provo on July 31, 1900.

The high school juniors will hold class day exercises May 26 next, and the seniors their class day exercises on commencement day, May 28. All will be held in the Salt Lake theater.

A fine banquet was held last evening at the Knutsford hotel by the convention of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, accompanied by toasts, speeches and music, and followed by a continuation of the business sessions.

Police Officer Ed Davies is mounted on a wheel and after the violators of the bicycle ordinance act. He can find plenty of them on East South Temple street, any afternoon. The restricted district includes Eighth East to Fourth West, and Sixth South to East South Temple and Third streets.

Francis Parrott and James Edgar, who broke into and robbed the postoffice station on West Seventh South street last February, were sentenced yesterday afternoon, by Judge Marshall of the federal court at St. Louis, to a term of 18 months in the federal penitentiary at Golden, Colo., and fined each \$5. Deputy United States Marshal Smyth will take the prisoners away this week.

They had been present at the Provo picnic, and are much interested in making the convention a success, and special trains will be run, street parades held, and various festivities presented. The guests of honor were the city council, the chief and captain of police and members of the Wholesale Grocers' association. There was a social program in which the following participated: Messrs. Duncan, Ashby, Braby and Poll, Thomas Ashworth, Walter Poulton, Thomas Slight, Professor J. S. Fensholt, A. O. Foulton, William Calder, Adolph Laubenger, Master C. Woods and Joseph Paul. President Benjamin Fullmer made the address of welcome, and the committee of arrangements were E. C. Allen, chairman; F. H. Horsley and A. Pritchard.

The second edition of the "News" did not appear on the streets till nearly 5 o'clock yesterday, and the way the telephone office was jammed with calls from all sections of the town and county came well-nigh taxing the patience of the operators. The trouble was due to one of the employees of the Utah Light & Railway company, who accidentally cut off a wire which furnishes the power to the "News" presses. It took over an hour to locate the trouble, before the big press could be started up again. Not only was the city delivery delayed, but the Provo, Lehi and American Fork circulations, Murray and the suburban districts south and the newboys' rates on the streets were held back fully an hour. Manager Campbell of the power company has taken every means to prevent a possible recurrence of the difficulty.

TO DRY FARMERS OF THIS COUNTY.

General Committee Reports Progress in Utah Lake Improvement Matter.

MAN Y QUESTIONS TO BE SOLVED.

Some Are Now Being Discussed With The Government in Order to Evolve An Acceptable Plan.

TWO MILES OF PAVED STREETS.

This Much Will Be Added to That Already Within the Corporate Limits of Salt Lake.

SOUTH TEMPLE & SECOND SOUTH City Engineer's Plan is Adopted—Effort Made to Rescind Fernstrom's Resolution.

Action was taken by the city council last night towards adding at least two miles of paved streets to the city's paved district. The streets to be paved are South Temple from State to Tenth and Second South from Third to Ninth east. The report of the committee on streets and engineering was adopted which recommends that City Engineer Snow's plan for paving South Temple street be adopted and that the city recorder be instructed to advertise notice of intention to make the improvement. So that after nearly two years of consideration as to the plan of that work an agreement has been reached between the council and the property owners as to the plan to be used and the work will be commenced as soon as possible to let the contracts.

SECOND SOUTH PAVING.

The Anderson Real Estate Investment company and a large number of other property owners on east Second South street representing a total frontage of 2 1/2 feet, petitioned the council asking that that street be paved with asphalt from Third East to Ninth East street. Councilman Elack said that the property owners were anxious to have the improvement made, and that the signatures to the petition represented a frontage of 2 1/2 feet more than was necessary to make the improvement. He moved that the work be granted, and that the city recorder be instructed to advertise notice of intention to make the improvement. The motion was carried.

TO RESCIND RESOLUTION.

A communication was received from the board of public works recommending that the Fernstrom resolution be rescinded, which requires that 75 per cent of any special tax be collected before the contractor is authorized to proceed with the work for which such tax was levied. The board asked that the work be commenced as soon as the tax is levied without waiting for any of the tax to be collected. Martin favored the recommendation of the board, but E. F. Holmes objected to the council rescinding its resolution, as he said it would cause continual trouble if the board's recommendation is adopted as the council could not collect any of the tax in less than a year, and the contractors would not wait that length of time for their pay, and hence litigation would follow. A. J. Davis raised the point that the matter should have to be referred to the council in order to rescind the action on the former resolution. Upon his motion the communication was referred to the committee on streets and engineering with the city attorney associated.

FOR A BETTER ROAD.

A petition was received, signed by Le Grand Young and 136 others, asking that the City Creek canyon road be put in good condition by the removal of cobble stones, trimming the trees so that they will not interfere with vehicles passing along the road and preventing the creek from overflowing and making mud holes. The matter was referred to the committee on streets.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS.

Mayor Morris' veto of the resolution releasing P. J. Moran from fulfilling his contract in regard to the new city jail, was laid over for one week upon motion of Fernstrom.

A claim for \$200 damages was submitted by Mrs. J. E. Pollock, who claims that her household furniture and other personal property in her home at 227 east Second South street was damaged to that amount by the city recorder's men, who were engaged in the removal of cobble stones from the city street. The committee on claims will consider the matter.

City Recorder Critchlow, ex-officio clerk of the city court, registered a notice of appeal from the city council's decision of the month of April, for which \$3,021.75 were received as fines and forfeitures. The appeal was filed with the city recorder's office, and the city recorder's office will consider the matter.

Chief of Police Lynch asked the council for a leave of absence until the appropriation sufficient to defray his expenses to attend the eleventh annual convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, which will be held at St. Louis on May 6. The police and prison committee will consider the request.

An appropriation of \$100 was made by the council to assist the G. A. R. in a proper observance of Memorial day. The license ordinance introduced by black, increasing the license of peddlers, was passed by the council by a vote of 8 to 6. The council adjourned and attended the banquet of the Retail Grocers' association, to which an invitation had been received.
