

SCOURING THE COUNTRY FOR CURRY

Posses After the Leader of the Gang That Held Up the Great Northern Express Train.

MAN HAS PLENTY OF FRIENDS.

They Will Aid Him in Reaching His Fellow Criminals Where He Expects to Be Safe.

Chinook, Mont., Sept. 20.—Posses are scouring every section of the country in the vicinity of Bear Paw mountains after Kid Curry, the leader of the gang which held up two Great Northern express trains on July 3, 1901, and who escaped from Knoxville jail while awaiting transportation to the Ohio penitentiary to serve out a twenty-year sentence for forging signatures to the stolen bank bills obtained in the robbery.

The posses are composed of men well acquainted with the country in which Curry is traveling, and who are equally quick on the trigger as he or any of his gang. It is many miles from where the search is being prosecuted to the nearest telegraph point, and it may be days before an encounter before anything is known of what happened. Curry has lots of friends in the country through which he is passing, and they will aid him in reaching the rendezvous of his gang, where he will be safe from the posse of the Bear Paw mountains from pursuit or capture.

SULTAN OF SULU

Is No Longer a Subject of the United States.

Washington, Sept. 19.—The United States government no longer counts among its subjects the sultan of Sulu, with his six wives, his retinue of slaves and the resident datos who make up his cabinet. The ruler of a first class principality of the orient has been removed to Singapore.

KILLED BY A POLO BALL.

Nathan Swift, Son of the Packer, The Victim.

Chicago, Sept. 20.—Nathan Swift, son of Louis F. Swift, the packer, died from the effects of a blow from the temple with a polo ball at Onwentsia field during a game.

The accident at first was thought to be trifling. Mr. Swift was in a contest in which his companions were Frederick McLaughlin, W. W. Rathbone, Al Farwell, Sidney Love, Walter Keith, E. H. McCormick and Charles Gardner King.

The ball which struck Mr. Swift was one that went in the air and from the mouth of Mr. Love. Mr. Swift did not appreciate his danger until late in the game of the sun retreated into the west following the ball in its flight.

When the ball hit him he did not fall from his saddle, and when his companions attempted to help him he was so dazed as to make light of the injury. He was induced to dismount, but walked without aid from the field. Arriving home he complained of dizziness, and later went into a delirium, which was followed by his death.

The accident which resulted in Mr. Swift's death occurred yesterday afternoon. During the night an operation was performed to relieve a ruptured blood vessel near the brain. The operation, which was performed at the country home of the Swift family in West Lake county, seemed to give relief, but the effect was only temporary. Three physicians worked over him until the end.

Nathan Swift was born in Chicago in 1881. He was an enthusiastic athlete being especially fond of football and polo.

New Governor of Panama.

Panama, Columbia, Sept. 20.—Senator Obaldia today took over the functions of governor of Panama. The event was the occasion for great popular demonstrations by all parties. It is thought the appointment of Gov. Obaldia may perhaps exert influence against secessionist ideas, not only because he is a native of Panama, which fact engaged for him the sympathies of all, but because the appointment is a part of a general plan, the result of which will be the election of Gen. Reyes to the presidency and the approval of a canal treaty satisfactory to the United States.

Lost Body Recovered.

St. Johns, N. B., Sept. 20.—The body of Fred Downey, the deck hand who lost his life Saturday when the steamer Davis Weston was burned at Craig Point, on the St. John river, was recovered this morning and brought to St. John, but that of Stephen Hood-Rowan, the English boy who was also drowned, has not yet been found. Those injured in getting away from the burning steamer are doing well. None 13 seriously injured. Among the passengers were several American tourists, and they tell exciting stories of their escape.

Linares Dead Commercially.

Monterey, Mex., Sept. 20.—Dr. Roy Martin, quarantine inspector for the government, who recently returned from Linares, declares that the city is dead commercially and partly deserted on account of the prevalence of yellow fever. Although there are less than 200 cases in Linares, there are fully 2,000 people sick with various ailments.

Latest advices from Victoria state that but 12 cases of yellow fever now exist in that city. Mr. W. H. Leonard, representative of the bridge and masonry contractors on the Monterey division of the Mexican Central railroad, reports a most deplorable situation among the construction camps along the line. He says that there is scarcely a camp without yellow fever, and that there are many deaths.

Girl Arrested as a Horse Thief.

Reading, Cal., Sept. 19.—Eliza Boyd, an orphan girl, aged 16 years, was arrested today, charged with horse stealing. The woman was taken into custody by Abraham Leigh, a rancher, who found the missing animal in her possession. The girl professes that she traded for the horse.

Husband Dead, Wife Suicides.

Paris, Sept. 20.—James L. Perriere, a well-known newspaper man of New York, died here today as the result of a paralytic stroke. His wife in a fit of despondency soon afterward took her life. Mr. Perriere was formerly for several years an editor of the Paris edition of the New York Herald. He entered the service of the Associated Press in 1887. Mrs. Perriere is a widow and was employed in his Paris office.

Employs Rob Street Railway.

Lynn, Mass., Sept. 20.—Two employees of the Boston & Northern street railway were arrested in this city today in connection with the extensive frauds perpetrated upon that company by means of bogus transfer checks, which were exposed in Boston yesterday.

BOSTON'S BARBER REGULATIONS.

Board of Health Orders Sterilization of All That Barbers Use on Customers. A special dispatch from Boston, May 5, 1900, to the N. Y. Sun gives new regulations of the Boston Board of Health as to barber shops: Mugs, shaving brushes and razors shall be sterilized after each separate use thereof. A separate, clean towel shall be used for each person. Material to stop the flow of blood shall be used only in powdered form and applied on a towel. Powder puffs are prohibited. PRESIDENT'S HEALTH.

Proposed by Prince Ferdinand at a Banquet.

Sofia, Sept. 20.—Prince Ferdinand last night gave a dinner party at the palace in honor of J. B. Jackson, who, in the afternoon, had presented his credentials as the first American diplomatic agent to Bulgaria. The guests included F. H. Elliot, the British diplomatic agent, and the Bulgarian minister and high officials.

Prince Ferdinand proposed the health of President Roosevelt, and in English, and the court band played a selection of American airs. Great satisfaction is expressed not only in official but also commercial circles at America's action in establishing diplomatic relations with Bulgaria. The belief prevails that a great opportunity exists for developing a profitable export and import trade with the United States.

RAN INTO A HAND CAR.

A Woman Killed and Her Daughter Seriously Hurt.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Sept. 20.—A Rock Island passenger train, running with extra speed to make up lost time, ran into a handcar on which five people were riding, and as a result of the collision Mrs. James L. Roberts, aged 50, is dead, and her daughter Susie, aged 22, is seriously injured.

Mrs. Roberts, her daughter and three sons were traveling on the handcar to Fountain in attend church. The men were operating the car, and saw the train as it bore down upon them. They jumped and were uninjured. The women were sitting on the platform of the car and were unable to alight before the train was upon them. Mrs. Roberts' body was severed and horribly mangled.

The train was stopped and the passengers assisted in gathering up the scattered remains of their mother. The accident occurred three miles from Falcon.

DARING JAIL DELIVERY.

Three Negroes Assault Deputy Jailor and Escape.

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 20.—A daring jail delivery was accomplished here today. Squire Hillier, Clayton Day and Frank Chenault, negroes, all awaiting sentence for murder and robbery, made good their escape.

To accomplish it Chenault assaulted Deputy Jailor Merritt Williams with a bottle, seriously injuring him. Williams then opened the doors for the others.

The alarm was given immediately following the escape, and officials of the state prison, deputy sheriffs scoured the country today, without apprehending the prisoners.

MEXICAN MONEY.

Diaz Government Elated Over Result of Commissioners' Visit.

Mexico City, Sept. 20.—Great satisfaction is felt here over the news of the successful result of the visit to Europe of the Mexican monetary commission, and it is believed that the president's policy of financial reform is being carried out. The government's financial position is excellent.

Bull Fighting at Juarez.

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 20.—The new \$50,000 building at Juarez, on the Mexican border, was formally opened here today in the presence of 10,000 people, chiefly American.

Six bulls were tortured and put to death and several horses were slain by the bulls. Cervera, the famous Spanish bull fighter, is at the head of the troupe.

Bebel's Authority Re-established.

Dresden, Sept. 20.—Herr Bebel has re-established his authority in the socialist party by reviving his revolutionary policy against the revisionists by several hundred votes against 11 dissenting voices, and having elected an executive committee of his own choosing. It now looks as though the agitation against Herr Bebel, before the convention was encouraged by him in order that his absolute leadership of the party should be demonstrated, and the small faction opposed to him held up to the ridicule of the party.

Killed in Freight Wreck.

Pottsville, Pa., Sept. 20.—Two men were instantly killed in a freight wreck on the Monongahela railroad at Bridgeport today. The dead are Samuel Miller, 47, a man of Uniontown, crushed in caboose. William Gately, brakeman, of Mahonington, caught in caboose and crushed.

Both men, it is supposed, were asleep in the caboose while their engine was taking water, and the blame for the accident probably rests with them, as no flagman was out to warn other trains.

Ruptured a Blood Vessel.

St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 20.—James McCord, principal owner of several wholesale grocery houses in western cities and the head of other business enterprises, is believed to be fatally ill tonight from the effects of the rupture of a blood vessel, which occurred today while he was out driving. He is 73 years old and has been a resident of St. Louis for half a century.

French Singer Murdered.

Paris, Sept. 20.—Eugenie Fougero, the well-known music hall singer, was murdered during Friday night in her villa at Aix-les-Bains. A female servant was also murdered and another was so maltreated that she has lost her reason. Robbery was the motive for the crime.

Quarantine Against Nuevo Laredo.

Laredo, Texas, Sept. 20.—This city still maintains a vigorous quarantine against Nuevo Laredo, Mex. Little news of a reliable kind can be secured from across the river. United States Consul Garrett, who arrived in Nuevo Laredo today after having passed five days' quarantine at Sanchez station, stated that he had examined several cases of the prevailing disease and declares they are not yellow fever. Expert bacteriologists of the Mexican government have arrived and will investigate the cases in company with a yellow fever expert who is expected to arrive from Washington tomorrow.

Devonshire has decided to remain in the cabinet. It is practically certain that Austen Chamberlain, Lord Milner and Mr. Buxford will take the exchequer, colonies and India portfolios respectively, and the only surprise in the new appointments is likely to be the nomination of a strong man to the war office to determine how far the recommendations of the South African war commission can be carried out. Home Secretary Asquith started for Balmoral tonight, and he will probably be involved in the reconstruction changes.

HUNGARIAN CRISIS.

Count Andrássy May Form a New Ministry.

Vienna, Sept. 20.—Count Hedevaray, who placed his resignation as Hungarian premier in the hands of Emperor Francis Joseph some time ago, had audiences with the emperor both yesterday and today, which, it is rumored, have led to the solution of the Hungarian cabinet crisis, and a ministry will be formed either by Count Julius Andrássy or Koloman Szell.

Should this news be confirmed it will be due to the correct and patriotic attitude of Francis Joseph and his party. Kossuth declared resolutely against anything in the shape of a revolution, and even forbade any street demonstration on the anniversary of his father's birthday.

It is understood that the semi-official communication made yesterday explaining away the unfavorable construction placed in Hungary by the army order issued by the emperor Sept. 11 will be issued by the emperor Sept. 11 perial autograph receipt addressed to Count Hedevaray, and this proof that the emperor did not desire to ruffianize Hungarian susceptibilities will be emphasized by another imperial visit to Huda Pest as an indication of his continued confidence and good will.

THREE MEN DROWNED.

Found at Three Life-saving Stations Near Lewes, Del.

Lewes, Del., Sept. 20.—Three drowned men were found at the three life-saving stations near here this morning by surf men, one near every station, one near Rehoboth station, and one near Rehoboth station. The man found at Rehoboth was identified as Henry Joyce of Cape Breton, N. S., by his son Harry, who is one of the crew of a fishing steamer now at the breakwater. He has taken charge of his father's body and will have it buried here. Joyce was one of the crew of the wrecked schooner Hattie A. Marsh, and the others are supposed to be. The bodies are very much mutilated and nearly denuded. They were put in charge of an undertaker, and a coroner's inquest held this evening. The three bodies will be interred in the Methodist Episcopal cemetery here.

Woman Shot by a Tramp.

Boise, Ida., Sept. 20.—A special to the Statesman from Shoshone says this morning that Mrs. J. W. S. Emerson, wife of Dr. Emerson of Milner, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank R. Gooding of this place, had been shot and probably fatally wounded by her husband. The shooting, it was said, occurred at 2 o'clock this morning. Two wounds were inflicted. One bullet entered the left shoulder and the other passed five inches above the heart.

"Mr. and Mrs. Gooding, accompanied by Dr. Kleinman, hastened to Milner. Shortly after their arrival there, Mr. Gooding telegraphed relatives here that Mrs. Emerson had been shot by a burglar. He said she was resting easily. The story of the shooting brought here was to the effect that Dr. Emerson had been drinking and returned home to secure some money with which to gamble. His wife refused to let him have it, and he thereupon in a frenzy shot her.

The story was at once contradicted here and relatives and friends of the couple, who were greatly relieved by the news sent by Mr. Gooding, Dr. Emerson conducts a drug store at Milner.

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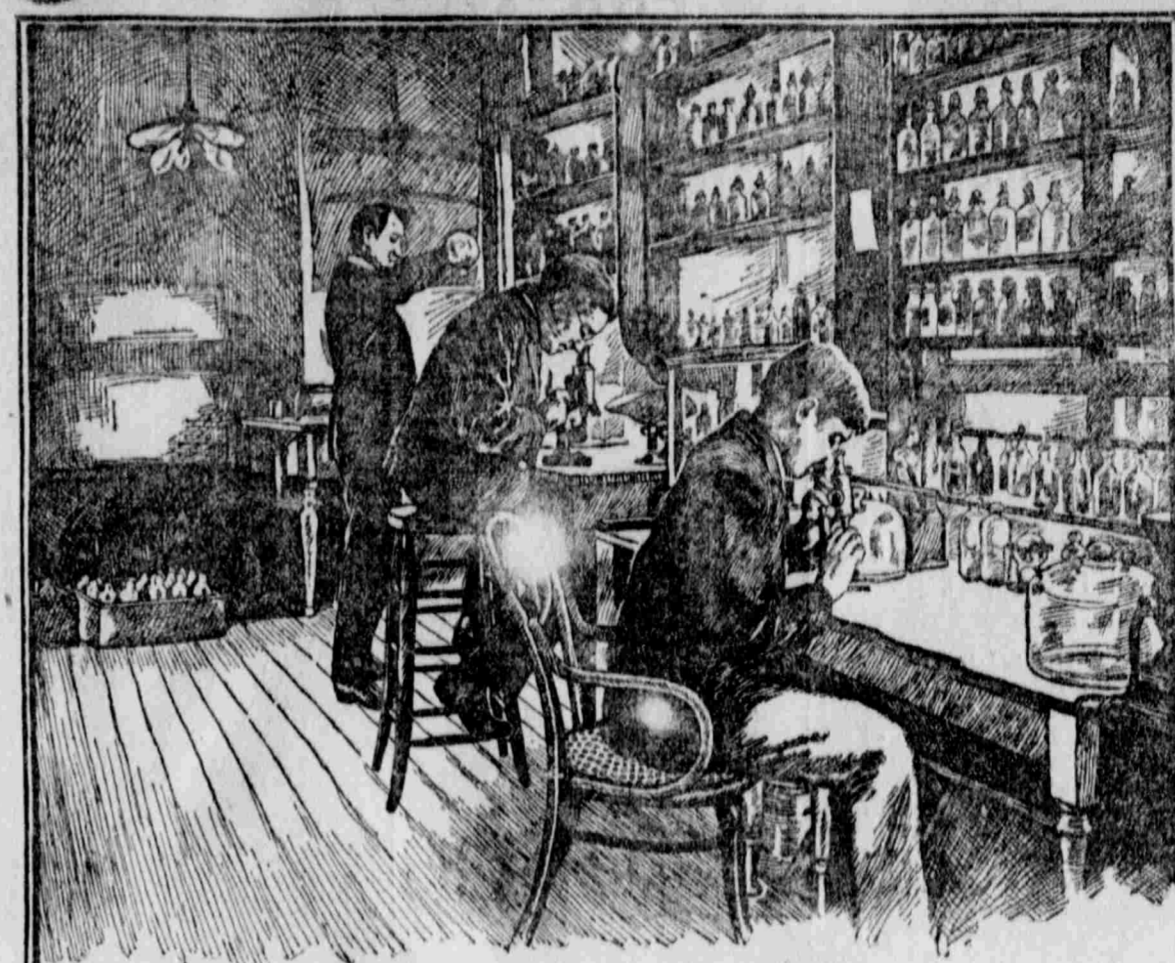
