MT. NEBO CO. IS RESTRAINED.

Suit Filed in District Court Today By Marie Larson Anderson, A Stockholder.

WHAT COMPLAINT CONTAINS.

Alleges That H. M. Short Made False Statements About Condition of Mine, also Assessments.

An injunction suit was filed in the district court today by Marie Larson Anderson against the Mt. Nebo Mining company and H. M. Short to restrain defendants from attempting to sell 4,000 shares of stock in said company owned by plaintiff, and upon which she claims and illegal assessment was levied.

It is alleged that in February, 1905, defendant Short represented a plaintiff that a good body of ore had been found in the mine, and that it was ready to ship ore and would declare a dividend by July of the same year.

In her second cause of action she alleges that on May 22, 1905 the directors of said company illegally levied an assessment of one cent per share upon the stock and has advertised her stock for sale today because of her failure to pay the assessment.

WORK ON THE BIG COPPER PLANT

Manager Charles W. Whitley Expresses Satisfaction at the Way Things Are Moving.

READY FOR OPERATION APRIL 1

Smelter to Cover an Area of Thirty Acres and Will Ultimately Handle 5,000 Tons of Ore Per Day.

When the new copper smelter of the American Smelting & Refining company, now in the course of construction at Gardfield beach, is completed, it will cover an area of about 30 acres.

The foregoing was included in a statement made by Charles W. Whitley, local manager of the big smelting concern, during the day, and is really the first official information that has been given to the public from the office of the corporation in the Gardfield beach since the turning of the first dirt nearly two months ago on the excavations for the immense buildings that are to grace the south shore of the Great Salt Lake.

The construction of the new smelter town is under the supervision of Consulting Engineer Karl Ehlers, who is also a member of the executive committee of the American Smelting and Refining company.

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FRANK E. BAXTER RESIGNS NOV. 1.

Division Engineer to be General Manager of New Construction Company.

REED SMOOT IS PRESIDENT.

Baxter, Straw & Storrs Co. is the Name of New Incorporation—Has Secured Contracts.

F. E. Baxter, division engineer of the Rio Grande Western for the past 10 years, has handed in his resignation, to take effect Nov. 1.

The new concern is the outgrowth of Straw & Storrs company, which has been operating for years and has found it necessary to increase its scope.

The company has now a contract for 40 miles of road on the Yellowstone park road, from St. Anthony, and a 50-mile contract on the Western Pacific in Featherstone canyon, Cal.

NEW SAN PEDRO TRAIN.

Officially Announced That It Will Be Put On December 1.

T. C. Peck, assistant general passenger agent of the Salt Lake Route, at Los Angeles, arrived in this city this morning on his way home from the Transcontinental Passenger association meeting in Chicago last week.

Peck announced that the definite date for putting on the new handsome limited through from Chicago to Los Angeles had been decided upon. "The new train will be put into service on Dec. 1," he said.

The train will leave Los Angeles at 11:30 a. m. via Salt Lake, and will arrive at Chicago at the same time on the third morning. Westbound better time will be made, the train leaving Chicago at 4 p. m. and arriving in Los Angeles at 4 p. m. on the third day.

The equipment on the train, which may also consist of a dining car, a dining parlor and a sleeping car, will be electric lighted and furnished with electric fans in the summer months.

Peck stated that the prospects for heavy travel this season were very bright. "When I left Chicago there were 324 people booked on the White Ribbon special and 15 sleepers had been filled with people going to the W. C. T. U. convention, which we will handle."

At the meeting in Chicago last week it was decided to put in a rate from Chicago to Los Angeles plus \$2 for the round trip for the N. E. A. convention, and the Baptists and Shriners, who will convene in Los Angeles next year. Colonists' rates were also decided upon as told already in the dispatches.

Mr. Peck remains here until tonight, when he pulls out for home.

SPIKE AND RAIL.

Emma Eames, with her piano, are booked over the Salt Lake Route for Los Angeles following the engagement here.
