The regular monthly meeting of the Ogden City Sunday School Union was held on the evening of the 26th inst., in the Second Ward Assembly Room. The assurance that there is always someone to be found interested in the progress of education, especially at home or in our midst, is my excuse for the following

Davis County has been particularly favored the past winter and the present spring in the number of writing classes that have been established in several of the settlements, for the study of what I think proper to call one of the fine arts, writing, conducted by Prof. A. J. Phelps, of Bountiful, who is generally pronounced a very successful teacher. He is teaching a class of about 70 pupils in Farmington, another class in Centerville and a second term class of about 80 pupils in Bountiful. He expects to be called upon to take up a second class in Farmington as soon as the present term expires, such is the satisfaction he has given.

But the above is only a part of what I wish to tell about. To interest his classes he has chosen a novel way of his own, among other things he has had them do and for which he has given premiums, is the transposition of words, or giving out a word for competition from which to produce the greatest number of other words. The word he has chosen to give this class throughout the county is the word "Startle." Mr. Crook and Mr. G. A. Lincoln, of Bountiful, produced each 92 words, Daniel T. Miller, of this place took

the premium for producing 129 words, while Walter Walker produced 124, they being the only two out of 230 pupils throughout the county who produced over 100 words.

Well, I think the result must certainly be in the art of writing that Davis County will come out ahead. I will just say before closing that if any one should question the number of words produced from the word "Startle" they can be furnished when called for.

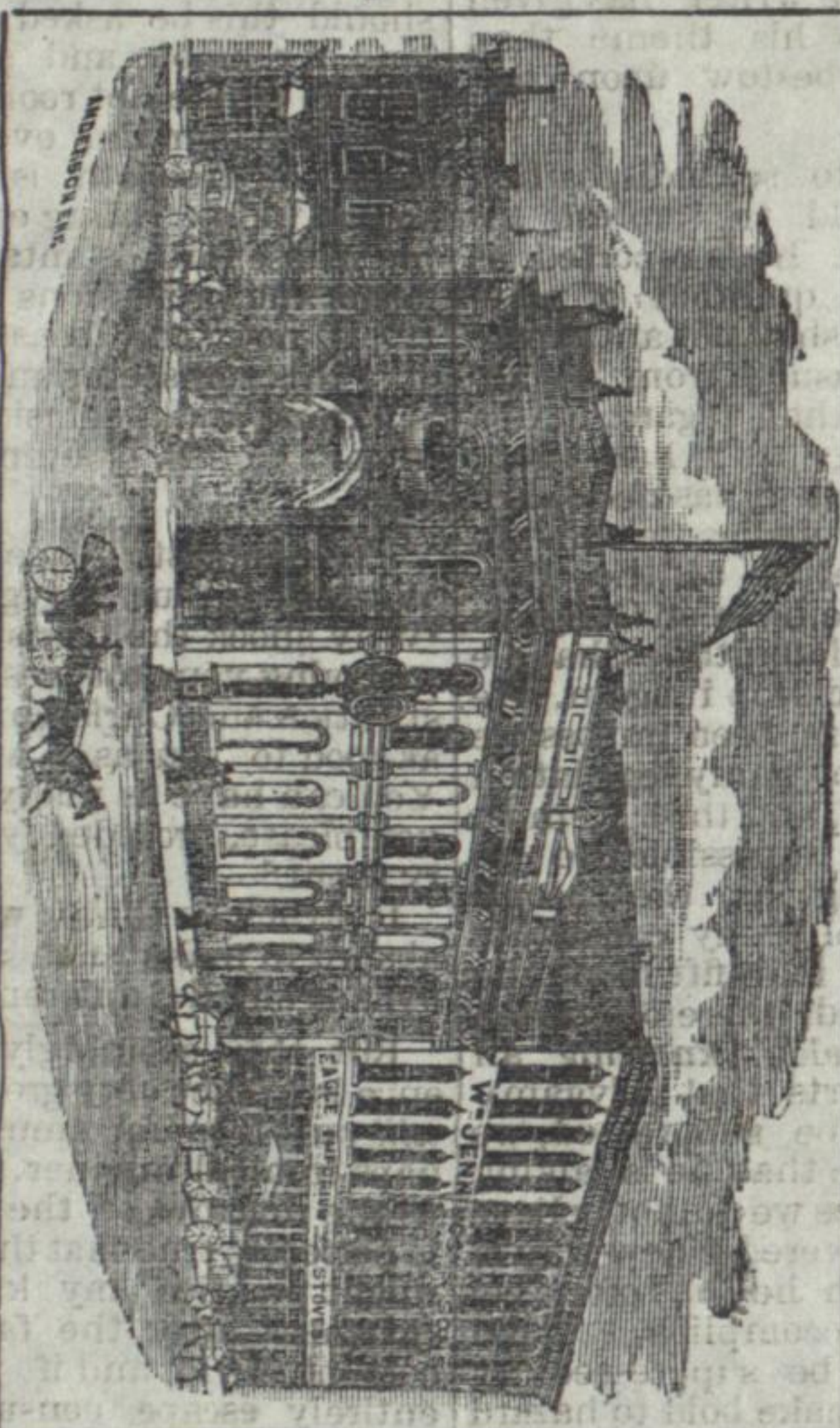
