We had a good time at our conference held yesterday and on Saturday, under the guidance and direction of A. K. Thurber and his associate counselor in the presidency of the Stake, Wm. H. Seegmiller. The usual preliminaries and finales were attended to throughout. We were favored with the presence and able addresses of Bishop Farnworth and Elder C. H. Wheelock, in the interest of the Manti Temple, who took along with them \$115.50 in monthly cash offerings and certificates of deposit of grain in some of the settlements. We had good talk of Indian life, their past and present condition from Elder Hamlin, whose manner, experience and calling bespeak his wonderful adaptation for the work. We were ably addressed from time to time by the presidency and by those of their brethren present whom they called upon to assist them, on the subjects of tithing, education, and the building of temples, all requiring earnest and united effort. We were visited by Junius F. Wells, in the interest of Mutual Improvement Associations, who left a favorable impression wherever he went. It was regretted that he had to leave, as our conference was close at hand.

We have had a very heavy fall of snow, which made it more difficult for the saints to come from the more distant settlements; but on the Sunday there was quite a full meeting, and there was unanimity in sustaining by uplifted hand the general and local authorities, as also in the adoption of the matters presented for acceptance. In fact, our conference was a renewal of happy greetings and seasonable instruction—a season of which we do not get weary, but anticipate with pleasure, and so far have not been disappointed.

He is a man worthy the confidence of the entire community, and is respected of all in the place. John P. Bush and H. McCune are his counselors.

On the following Sunday we had a meeting, where the Spirit of God was richly poured upon the speakers and hearers, and certainly it was a grand feast for the saints here. Last Sunday, our worthy brother and friend, Wm. Fotheringham, of Beaver, paid us a visit and spoke to large congregations afternoon and evening, and was blessed with the power of the Holy Ghost. Also Bro. Winsler, from the St. George Temple, was here on business, and gave us some good instructions and invitations to come to the Temple and do something for our dead. Our bishop has invited everybody to send for their recommend so they may be enrolled in this branch of the Church, and he also invited us to get a Sunday school in operation as we have plenty of little ones in the ward. The next thing will be a meeting house to which I understand about one hundred dollars has already been subscribed. Our present hall is too small for the accommodation of the Saints here, as many of our brethren from the settlements who are freighted are off and on here, and like to go to meeting whenever an opportunity offers itself.

Milford is very dull at present, very little business going on,


