WIPED OUT.

Heavy Loss Sustained by Utah Bed ding & Manufacturing Co.

BIG CROWD WITNESSES FIRE

Loss is Estimated at \$18,000, Including the Damage Done to Felt's Lumber Yard.

The plant of the Utah Bedding and Manufacturing company on Eighth South between West Temple and State streets was nearly destroyed by fire rate yesterday afternoon, and the lumber yard of George P. Felt, adjacent to the plant, was damaged to some extent.

It is thought that the fire started in the cotton bin on the ground floor of the building. The flames made such rapid headway in the dry and extremely combustible material that the fire was absolutely beyond control by the time the fire apparatus reached the scene. The office of S. S. Dickinson & Co. fire apparatus reached the scene. The only thing left for the fire fighters then to do was to prevent the flames from spinading.

The fire was discovered by Joe Satori, a boy who works at the machine. He said that almost within the twinkling Billousness. of an eye the flames had filled the room and leaped to the second floor.
