Fork Canyon Reservoir Proposition-To Increase Canal Stock.

County Treasurer A. D. Chambers and his able deputies have been working almost night and day during the past week collecting in the many thousands of dollars which have been paid on this year's taxes. Up to Saturday night about \$190,000 of the taxes had been collected, leaving a balance of about \$135,000 of taxes still unpaid. Mr. Chambers has decided to leave the tax rolls open during this week, so as to accommodate the many farmers who have not yet paid their taxes, they having depended on the returns from their sugar beets to pay their taxes, and the sugar company paid for the October beets only on Saturday. Many of the largest business firms in the city have not yet paid their taxes owing to the great rush at the treasurer's office last week, but will settle this week. It is estimated that at least \$60,000 of taxes will be paid doing this week, leaving a balance of about \$75,000 of taxes un paid to go on the delinquent tax list. All those who have not yet paid their taxes for this year are urged by the county treasurer to pay up during this week and save the extra costs of delin-
