ONE MORE WEEK FOR TAXES

Impressive Funeral Services Over Remains of William H. West.

Saloon Must Close on Sunday—South Fork Canyon Reservoir Proposition—To Increase Canal Stock.

County Treasurer A. D. Chambers and his able deputies have been working almost night and day during the past week collecting in the many thousands of dollars which have been paid on this year's taxes. Up to Saturday night about \$150,000 of the taxes had been collected, leaving a balance of about \$125,000 of taxes still unpaid. Mr. Chambers has decided to leave the tax rolls open during this week, so as to accommodate the many farmers who have not yet paid their taxes, they having depended on the returns from their sugar beets to pay their taxes, and the sugar company paid for the October beets only on Saturday. Many of the largest business firms in the city have not yet paid their taxes owing to the great rush at the treasurer's office last week, but will settle this week. It is estimated that at least \$50,000 of taxes will be paid during this week, leaving a balance of about \$75,000 of taxes unpaid to go on the delinquent tax list. All those who have not yet paid their taxes for this year are urged to call on county treasurer to pay up during this week and save the extra costs of delinquent publishing.

SALOONS MUST CLOSE SUNDAYS.

Orders went out from Chief of Police Conlist Saturday evening that all saloons in the city must close their doors at midnight and keep their doors closed until midnight last night and each and every Sunday hereafter. These orders were given to all saloonkeepers by the chief and captain and in accordance with the same all such saloons were closed at midnight and no intoxicants were sold during that time. The city was very quiet and only one drunk was arrested; he had evidently prepared for the occasion.

FUNERAL OF WM. H. WEST.

The funeral services over the remains of the late William H. West were held at the Fourth ward meeting house Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Bishop's Counselor Henry Gillman presiding. The ward choir furnished choice music, and the opening prayer was pronounced by Elder Charles Welch. The speakers were President L. W. Shurtliff, Elders Joseph Parry, W. H. Burton and Bishop's Counselor Hyrum Belnap. They each eulogized the life of the deceased, referring feelingly to his many good deeds of kindness, and to his love for that which was pure and Godlike. Benediction was pronounced by Father George W. Larkin Sen. Many beautiful floral tributes were on the casket, evidencing the high esteem in which the deceased was held in the city. A large funeral cortege followed the remains to the city cemetery where they were laid to rest in the family burial ground.

RESERVOIR PROPOSITION.

A goodly number of farmers met at the county court house Saturday afternoon for the purpose of further considering the proposition of building a large reservoir in South Fork Canyon to store water for irrigating purposes. Moroni Skeen and F. S. Miller were appointed a committee to negotiate for the purchase of the land for the reservoir site. If the land can be obtained for a reasonable figure the projectors expect to purchase the same, and incorporate a company to build the reservoir. The meeting will be held at the same place at 11 a. m. They expect to have the reservoir built so as to store water for next season.

WANT TO INCREASE CAPITAL.

The meeting of the stockholders in the Weber and Davis Counties Canal company which was called for Saturday in the court house, was adjourned for one week without doing any business, there not being two-thirds of the stockholders present, and that number necessary in order to vote on the proposition to increase the capital stock of the corporation from \$250,000 to \$500,000. The increase of the capital stock is necessary in order to use the company on a good financial basis, so that they can put their canal in a condition to carry the increased flow of water which has been arranged for by the large reservoir built last year.

NO SERIOUS DAMAGE

From Visit of Earthquake—Harvesting Fourth Crop of Hay.

Special Correspondence. St. George, Washington Co., Nov. 14.—A shock of earthquake passed through this city last night about 9:40 o'clock. There were three distinct oscillations, giving everything a general shaking up. People who had retired to bed and did not realize the cause of such disturbance hurried up to see who was taking off their wagons; others thought someone was trying to shake doors and windows out and wished to free postal delivery was carried at that time of night. No very serious damage is reported except the cracking of the ceiling in two rooms of the new school building.

The weather continues very fine and dry. The fourth cutting of lucern hay is coming in rapidly, and a larger acreage of fall wheat is being planted. Business in general is quite lively and the health of the people has improved since the cooler weather. "Jack Frost" put in an appearance in a mild way about a week ago.

PANACA, NEVADA.

Lincoln County Feels the Seismic Waves—Railroad Prospects.

Special Correspondence. Panaca, Lincoln Co., Nevada, Nov. 14.—The town of a hamlet, the earthquake here last night at 9:40. Two distinct shocks were felt, each lasting nearly a minute, with about 30 seconds between them. Furniture rattled, rocking chairs rocked, and hanging lamps swayed several inches. Every body felt the peculiar movement, except some who were sleeping soundly.

We are having some very cool nights lately, but the days are quite pleasant. The railroad excitement has abated considerably, and it looks doubtful about our having a railroad train for Christmas, as promised.

FATAL RAILROAD WRECK.

Two Men Killed and Another Loses a Leg, in Oregon Short Line Collision.

Orville Nygaard Thrown Under a Load of Hay and Fatally Injured—Indian Harvest Dance.

Special Correspondence. Pocahontas, Idaho, Nov. 16.—A fatal wreck occurred this morning at 3:30, near Orchard, some 200 miles west of here. A helper engine was backing down and ran into freight No. 22 eastbound, which was supposed to be waiting at Orchard, the helper engine having the right-of-way. Brakeman Chas. Wallace was instantly killed. Engineer Martin J. Cosgrove succumbed to his injuries before noon; he was severely scalded. Fireman Knox had one leg cut off. These men belonged to the freight train. Engineer McDowell and Fireman Olan, of the helper were both seriously but not fatally injured, but the brakeman escaped unhurt. Mr. Cosgrove was engaged to marry a young lady of this city, and the wedding was appointed for Christmas. One engine and six cars were derailed and the road was blocked for nearly twelve hours. The property damage is comparatively small. A wrecking train accompanied by Supt. Manson left here at once for the scene of the wreck.

HARVEST DANCE OF INDIANS.

The Bannock and Shoshone Indians on this reservation are holding their annual Harvest dance on the bottom of the Snake river below here. They have made arrangements to accommodate visitors and all well behaved people are welcome.

A \$1000 hospital is to be built soon. The cost of the building of the Indians; \$75,000 is appropriated by the government for an Indian school soon to be built, and Pocahontas is casting "good-eyes" at Fort Hall, and wants to have a new hospital built.

The removal of the two old ice houses, near the depot has been begun, and same rumor says that it is the first move towards the building of the half million dollar new shops here.

Martha Jenkins has been appointed administrator of the estate of the late Thos. D. Jenkins.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

On Wednesday evening, a fatal accident occurred near here. Orville, the young son of Christian Nygaard of Blackfoot, was accompanying by his father on a load of hay to Pocahontas, when the horse, which was in the creek section house the wagon upset, throwing the boy to the ground, and all the hay on top of him. The father made a frantic effort to rescue the boy, but the horse was also buried under the load and the work of moving the hay had to be done by hand. It was nearly dark before the boy was reached, and he was almost dead. The only last word he uttered was "father," and he died. The grief-stricken father now continued his journey into the city, where he has a brother living, and where the funeral will be held. The body was prepared for burial and taken back to Blackfoot for interment.
