Four Feet of Gold Ore Exposed-New Sensation Shipment-Draining a Mine-Notes.

Secretary of State Hammond this morning received a copy of the amended articles of incorporation of the American Smelting & Refining company, accompanied by a snug little check for \$8,750, the capital stock having been increased from \$65,000,000 to \$100,000,000. This makes \$37,500 that the passage of the fee bill has brought into the state treasury so far. Previous to the passage of this bill the fee was 25 cents pere \$1,000 of capital stock, but the maximum fee which could be charged was \$2,500; but the new bill knocked off the limit so that now every corporation pays a straight 25 cents per \$1,000, whatever the size of the capital stock is.

STRIKE IN CARIBOO.

MINNIE BUTTE SUIT.

Judge Marshall Decides an Interesting Point of Law.

Judge Marshall this morning rendered a decision sutaining the demurrer of the defendant in the case of Minnie Butte vs De Lamar Mercur Mining company. The suit for dam-ages for injuries alleged to have been sustained as the result of a fall in a twenty foot shaft at night. There is a path within six feet of the shaft, but the plaintiff could not see where it was and fell into the shaft, which was unfenced. It was claimed also that this path has been used for two years by miners and others, and that license to use it was given by the company. Judge Marshall holds that those who use the path were licensees with no right except protection against an ac-tion for trespass. The plaintiff was not on the ground for the purpose of transacting any business in which the defendant company was interested, and, as the shaft was there before the path was used and the company did nothing to increase the dange, no damages could be claimed. He also makes the interesting point that min-ing property differs from other property in that its use requires the sinking of shafts, which the possessors cannot be bound by law to fence or protect.
