Joseph objected to the adop-tion of the report, saying that it was the old private bank bill in disguise. His objections were overruled, and the report was adopted.

COMPULSORY PRIMARY BILL. When the Ltgislature first convened

When the Ltgislature first convened Hollingsworth was an ardent admirer of the compulsory primary laws of eastern states, which aim a blow at the source of the boss power in politics, and spread the authority of the county chairman out among the people who are good citizens. He introduced the measure he has been planning ever since, as S. B. 137, yesterday. He said in connection with it, that it in no way was intended for passage this session, that it was introduced to give the mat-ter publicity, to encourage discussion, and to get the matter before the people so that it might be made a subject for final action at the next session. The bill provided for a compulsory system of nominations in counties having a population of over 10,000, the system to be adopted optionally in smaller coun-ties. adopted optionally in smaller coun-

Another measure introduced by Holingsworth is S. B. 128, providing for the mauguration of the Torrens system of and registration, in use now in Ore-

gon and Illinois. The Portland fair bill passed through the senate again, with a number of house amendments. One of them striking out the words "advice and" from the expression "with the advice and consent of the senate" in relation to appointments to the com-

The relation to appointments to the com-mission, was explained by Bamberger to mean that the house wanted the sen-ate's consent, but not its advice. Callister opposed accepting the amendment on a constitutional objec-tion. His motion lost. Johnson thought it would be a fine thing to accept the amendment. "We get one of our bills back alive," he said,
