## CONGRESSIONAL.

### SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 8.—Booth submitted a concurrent resolution providing that in the electoral count any congressman, when the Senate and House are in joint convention, may object to any certificate whereupon the President pro tem. of the Senate shall rule. An appeal may be taken from such ruling, and each separately may ballot as to whether the President be sustained. If they disagree, an appeal may be taken to the Supreme Court, where the decision shall be final. The Supreme Justices, in deciding, may receive in evidence the proceedings of any State officer, or board of State officers, and the reports of congressional committees; ordered pointed.

Wallace submitted a resolution instructing the special electoral committee to report as to the powers of the electoral college, and whether each house may examine both the facts and law to enable it to determine whether the returns are true; if the appointment of electors by the State was according to constitutional provisions, and further, that where there is no return, the House acting concurrently, must determine which is correct, and no electoral vote can be counted without the concurrence of both Houses. He spoke at length on these propositions.

The Chair presented a resolution by the Secretary of the Treasury calling attention to the necessity for an additional appropriation of \$50,000 for the payment of temporary Treasury clerks, that the department's business might not be embarrassed; referred.

Wallace spoke at length in regard to the powers of Congress in counting the electoral vote, and after a short executive session the Senate, at 4.45, adjourned.

### HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 8.—Bright introduced a bill for the free coinage of silver dollars and making the same a legal tender. The bill was referred to the committee on mines and mining, notwithstanding the efforts of O'Brien and Kass to have it referred to the committee on coinage.

Hunter introduced a bill to authorize and equip an expedition to the north pole, and to establish a temporary colony, for purposes of exploration, at the point north of the 81st degree of north latitude, on or near the shore of Lady Franklin Bay; to detail officers or other persons in the public service to take part in the same, and to use any public vessel that may be suitable for the purpose, the scientific operations of the expedition to be prosecuted in accordance with the advice of the naval academy for the purpose. Referred to the committee on naval affairs.

A bill to abolish the District of Columbia police commissioners and to transfer their duties to the district commissioners, passed by a unanimous vote.

Buckner offered a resolution to utilize the product of gold and silver mines, and to authorize the president to issue currency, convertible into gold and silver.

Miles, of Texas, offered a resolution denouncing the lawless invasion, by an armed force, of the soil of any State or Territory, under whatever pretext, as among the gravest of crimes. Lost for want of a two-thirds majority—107 to 82.

Lawrence asked consent to offer a resolution instructing the committee on education and labor to ascertain whether, in every State, an equal opportunity for common school education, including school privileges for equal time, is secured to colored and white children, and if not to report a bill to enforce the constitution in that respect.

Knott objected to suspend the rules and adopt the resolution—yeas 119, nays 78. Not two thirds in the affirmative.

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to see 100,000 armed men in this city patiently awaiting the result, and determined in their views of the American right to appeal. He knew that all appliances of peace should be used in the settlement of the question, but the people were not prepared to submit to usurpation, in the event of which a second Jackson would be ready to lead them to the preservation of the constitution and government.

Banning said the people want peace, but there must be no bayonets in the house. The speakers declared their belief that the rank and file of the republican party would be with the mass of the democracy in their views as to how the question should be settled, by the count being made as has always been the case.

The resolution of the meeting declared it to be the duty of both Houses of Congress to exercise the usual and constitutional jurisdiction in the final examination and counting of the electoral ballot. They declare "Tilden" and "Hendricks" elected, and that the counting should be left in the hands of their fellow-citizens, without distinction of party, to discover by peaceful means, and to enforce by constitutional agencies, the solution of the question.

The Electoral Vote—Congress and the Count.

MONTELEONE, VT., 8.—A large number of prominent democrats, representing nearly every county in the State, met with the State committee, to-night, adopted resolutions touching the presidential controversy, sustaining the action of Congress in settling in investigating committee to Florida, Louisiana and South Carolina, and insisting on the right of Congress to determine the electoral vote.

The Virginia Democrats will Uphold the Constitution and Have an Honest Election.

RICHMOND, VA., 8.—A mass meeting of the citizens of Richmond, and all the citizens of Virginia in the city, was held to-night in the House of Delegates, to consider the issue involved in the solution of the presidential controversy, and to adopt resolutions giving assurance to the country that Virginia is loyal and true to the Union and Constitution. "Ex-United States Senator R. M. Hunter, presided, and the meeting was participated in by a large number of leading and representative men from all parts of the State.

Resolutions were adopted declaring that the complications that have arisen have been caused by the illegal and fraudulent practices of the returning board; that the president of the United States is in danger; and to bring the conspirators to trial at the bar of the Senate.

Resolved, That it is the duty of the House of Representatives, the grand inquest of the nation, to inquire into said conspiracy, and if officers of the government have been guilty of such a crime, to impeach and remove them from office, and have committed overt acts in furtherance of the plot, by an illegal use of the army or otherwise, to take immediate action to defeat the conspiracy and to bring the conspirators to trial at the bar of the Senate.

Resolved, That the president of this convention send a copy of these resolutions to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, with a request that each lay the same before the bodies over which they respectively preside.

Another Inauguration.

St. Louis, 8.—PHELPS, Governor elect, was inaugurated at Jefferson City this afternoon. The inaugural address dwells at some length upon national affairs. Referring to the alleged corruption which threatens to thwart the will of the people at the presidential election, he says: "Missouri will be peaceful but is determined in adhering to her constitutional rights."

has occurred, those who are required to perform the duty are the sole judges as to when the contingency arises, and, in accordance with this principle, we declare that it properly devolves upon each House of Congress to decide for itself whether the contingency shall arise that requires its separate action under the constitution in the election of President by the House of Representatives, and Vice President by the Senate.

Resolved, That in case the two Houses, after exhausting every parliamentary means, are unable to agree upon such a count of the electoral votes, then the person or persons of the whole number of electors appointed, it will then become the duty of the House immediately to choose a President, and of the Senate a Vice President, provided by the Constitution, and if the House shall choose a President according to such provisions, the counting of the electoral votes must be sustained, and all forcible opposition thereto be proceeded against as treason and rebellion.

They declare that the announcement by leading republican newspapers the morning after the election that South Carolina, Florida and Louisiana had gone for Hayes by a vote of 100,000, and that they had been received, followed by orders to the army to protect the boards of canvassers, issued before the boards were assembled and without reason to suspect dishonesty, together with the knowledge that the result of the election in these States could be changed so as to be for Hayes, and knowledge that the Louisiana returning board was the same which had formerly reversed the legal vote of the State, could only have been intended to notify those canvassing boards that they would be upheld in any villainous attempt, and the result proves that they appreciated the situation and committed the frauds that were expected of them.

Resolved, That the action of Judge Bond in overriding the State court; the action of the army in setting an illegal legislature in South Carolina; the concentration of troops in Louisiana; the establishment of the existence of a conspiracy by force and fraud to proclaim and inaugurate a president and vice-president contrary to the constitutionally expressed will of the American people.
