WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 .- By direction of the President, the Secretary of State, today informed Lord Sackville that for causes heretofore made known to Her Majesty's government, his continuance in his present official position in the United States is no longer acceptable to this government, and would consequently be detrimental to the friendly relations between the two countries.

There can be no controversy as to the complete severance of the ties of original allegiance by naturalization. Disputes upon this point were finally put at rest by the treaty of naturalization concluded by the two construes on the 13th

of May, 1870 Therefore it will not be con-tended, nor was such contention ever ad-mitted by us, that citizens of the United States of British Origin are subject in any claim to the country of their original al-The undersigned has also the honor to call attention to provisions of Section 5335. Revised Statutes of the United States, by which severe penalties are visited upon a citizen of the United States who, without the authority or permission of this government, commences or carries on any verball or written correspondence or interconfise with any foreign government or any officer or agent thereof, either with intent to influence the action of said government or its agents in relation to any disputes or controversies with the United States, or with intent to defent the measures of the government of the United States. These penalties are made equally applicable to every citizen of the United States, as well as authorized agents who counsels, advises or assists any such correspondence with a similar unlawful intent. It is to be observed that precedents are not wanting as to the question under crisideration. It is a settled rule, essential to the maintenance of international intercourse, that a diplomatic representative must be personam gratia to the government to which he is accredited. If by his conduct he renders himself a person non-gratia, the announcement of the fact may be made known to his government. In the present case all requirements of comity have been fulfilled, the facts having been duly communicated to Her Majesty's government, with an expression of opinion in regard thereto.
