ESCAPE FROM SHOCKING FATE

Mrs. J. Lund and Children Thrown From Buggy by Frightened Horse.

ogden, Sept. 17 .- While coming into Ogden yesterday from Plain City, Mrs. J. Lund and her two children had a narrow escape from being instantly killed by the overturning of a buggy and dragging them. As a result of the accident, Mrs. Lund sustained a number of painful injuries but none of which it is thought will prove fatal.

It was shortly after 10 o'clock yes-terday morning. Mrs, Lund was near-ing the road crossing in the Harrisville district, when the accident occurred. As the horse had traveled along with-out seeming to be afraid of anything before they reached the Harrisville crossing, Mrs, Lund drove near the track and waited for one of the Oregon Short Line excursion trains to Brigham City to pass. The train came with such speed that the roaring noise frightened the horse turned around sharp-ly and overturned the buggy, throwing the occupants to the ground, Mrs. Lund being rendered unconscious and the children escaping with slight scratches.
