ESCAPE FROM SHOCKING FATE

Mrs. J. Lund and Children Thrown From Buggy by Frightened Horse.

DEMOCRATS HOLD PRIMARIES

In Various City Wards Tonight—Incipient Riot at Harrison Ice Houses—S. L. Opera Co.

Ogden, Sept. 17.—While coming into Ogden yesterday from Plain City, Mrs. J. Lund and her two children had a narrow escape from being instantly killed by the overturning of a buggy and dragging them. As a result of the accident, Mrs. Lund sustained a number of painful injuries but none of which it is thought will prove fatal.

It was shortly after 10 o'clock yesterday morning, Mrs. Lund was near the road crossing in the Harrisonville district, when the accident occurred. As the horse had traveled along without seeming to be afraid of anything before, they reached the Harrisonville crossing, Mrs. Lund drove near the track and waited for one of the Oregon Short Line excursion trains to Brigham City to pass. The train came with such speed that the shouting woman frightened the horse and as the engine passed the horse turned sharply and overturned the buggy, throwing the occupants to the ground, Mrs. Lund and her children. The children were not injured, but the woman sustained a number of painful injuries but none of which it is thought will prove fatal.

The accident was witnessed by several hundred passengers on the train

and a number of men employed in the near-by fields who immediately rushed to the aid of the unfortunate woman and carried her to a farm house and Dr. D. S. Taplin of Harrisonville summoned. Upon investigation it was found that the woman had sustained painful injuries to her arms and hip, and possibly some internal injuries. The children had a few slight wounds on the face and hands but none were at all serious. Mrs. Lund, who is the wife of the electrician at the Bear River electric plant, was in Plain City to attend the funeral of her husband's father, James Lund, who died from injuries received about three weeks ago by falling from a wagon of grain.

INCIDENT RIOT.
What threatened to be a small sized riot was quelled at the Harrisonville ice houses yesterday afternoon when 200 Greeks were held at bay at the point of a revolver, while an injured American was taken from the scene to the hospital.

As near as could be learned, Andrie Larius, a Greek, employed at the ice house, injured his head and blinded his right eye, a young white employee, and immediately began abusing him. The latter resented it and then Bell's

two companions came to his protection. Without a moment's hesitation all the foreigners employed upon the job started after the white men, who in the meantime had got down on to the ground from the icing platform where the melee started.

In the mix-up between Larius and Bell the former sank his teeth into Bell's arm and side like a wild beast. One of Bell's companions hastened to the assistance of the injured man and threatened to shoot the first Greek who advanced upon the man. The sight of a gun made the foreigners cower and order was restored and Bell was taken to the hospital. A warrant for the arrest of Larius has been issued and the man will be brought into court upon a serious charge.

Thus far this year, 179 carloads of peaches have been shipped from Brigham City, and this does not include peaches from the canneries, nor those hauled away in wagons. The weather has not had a damaging effect on the peach crop. The first storm left some fungi, but now to an appreciable degree. The growers say that a little more spring frost would have helped them, as it would have tended to "thin" their orchards. In the past, the growers have depended upon the natural seasons for the thinning of the crops, but now they say it is necessary to attend to this important matter themselves.

Bumper Dry Farm Crops—Fruit Going to Waste.

Tooele, Tooele Co., Sept. 14.—The death of Mrs. Sarah Catherine Tilman occurred in this city on Saturday evening last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Bates, the cause of death being internal cancer. Mrs. Tilman was born in Georgia April 10, 1850, and will be well remembered by many of the elders here. She was married to George Bates in 1870, and her deceased husband being largely instrumental in tracing the murders of Elders Gibbs and Berry. She was a faithful Latter-day Saint. Funeral services were held today. Interment will be in Salt Lake City cemetery this evening.
