Washington, Jan., 9 .-- The Nicaragua canal bill passed in the House this afternoon, ayes 308, nays 2. Messrs. Fletcher (Rep., Minn.), and Lassiter (Dem., Va.), cast the negative votes. The announcement was greeted with The bill as passed authorizes the

President to secure from the states of Costa Rica and Nicaragua in behalf of the United States, control of such a portion of territory belonging to said states as may be desirable and necessary, on which to excavate, construct and operate a canal suitable to the wants of modern navigation and commerce and appropriate such a sum as may be necessary to secure the con-trol of the said territory.

Makes an Appropriation of \$180,-

000,000 for the Waterway.

Bection 2 authorizes the President, after securing control of the needed territory, to direct the secretary of war to construct such a canal from the Caribbean sea at a point near Grey-town in Nicaragua, by way of Lake Nicaragua to a point on the Pacific ocean near Brito, and also to construct proper harbors at the terminal of said canal, and to make necessary provisions for the defense of the canal and harbors.

Sections 3 and 4 authorize the President to make such surveys as may be necessary and to employ such persons in constructing the canal as may to him seem wise, and directs that in the construction of the canal the river San Juan and Lake Nicaragua shall be used as far as they are available. Section 5 authorizes the President to

guarantee to the states of Costa Rica and Nicaragua the use of the canal and harbors upon terms to be agreed upon, for vessels owned by citizens

The last section makes an appropriation of \$10,000,000 to carry on this work and authorizes the secretary of war to enter into proper contracts for ma-terial and work, as may be deemed necesary therefor, such work and material be paid for as appropriations may. be made from time to time. The section fixes the aggregate cost at \$180, 000,000 to be drawn from the treasury on warrants of the President.
