POWER IS IN THE

State Board of Equalization Cannot Assess Semi-Public Corporations.

SUPREME COURT SO HOLDS.

Matter Was Made a Test Case, and · Is of Great Importance to All Concerned.

The state board of equalization has not the power to make the assessment on the property of street railway electric light and other like corporations when such property does not extend outside the boundaries of the county wherein it is situated, such power being in the county asssessor of the county. The above is the effect of an opinion which has been handed down by the supreme court in the case of the State of Utah ex rel Salt Lake City vs Benjamin R. Eldredge, county assessor, and Salt Lake county. The court also holds that section 2513 of the session laws of 1899 is unconstitutional for the reason that it gives the board of equalization powers to make the askessment on all the property of railroad, street railway, car, depot, telegraph and telephone companies in the state without regard to whether or not their property extends into more than one county.

When the Utah Light & Power company and the Consolidated Railway company merged into one company County Assessor Eldredge raised the question as to whether he or the state board of equalization should assess the property of the new company. Before the consolidation the property of one of the companies had been assessed by the county assessor and that of the other by the board of equalization. County Attorney Westervelt was asked for an opinion on the matter and held that section 2513 of the laws of 1899 was unconstitutional and that the county assessor should make the assessment on the property of all corporations which lie within the boundaries of the county. In order to test the matter City Attorney Dey, on behalf of the city, filed'a petition in the supreme court for a writ of prohibition to prohibit County Assessor Eldredge from making the assessment on such property contemplated in section 2513. It is upon this writ of prohibition that the opinion of the supreme court was ren-

Section 2513 of the laws of 1899, which the court holds is unconstitutional, is as follows: "All property and franchises owned by railroad, street railway, car, depot, telegraph and telephone companies in

dered.

this state must be assessed by the state board of equalization as herein-after provided." Before that section was passed by the Legislature, the statutes of the state provided that the board of equaliza-tion should assess the property of all railroad, street railway, car, telegraph and telephone companies operating in more than one county of the state. It was evidently the intention of those who secured the adoption of the amendment to this section of the statutes to take the power of assessing the Ogden union depot out of the hands of the county assessor of Weber county and place it within the jurisdiction of the board of equalization. Hence the word 'depot' was inserted and the words

operating in more than one county of the state" were omitted. The opinion of the supreme court, which was written by Justice Bartch and concurred in by Chief Justice Bas-kin and Justice McCarty, follows in

"From the foregoing considerations it is clear that the Legislature has no power, under the Constitution, to au-thorize the state board of equalization to assess or value property, for the purposes of taxation, the situs and opera-tion of which are wholly within one county. In so far as section 2513 and 68, session laws, 1899, undertakes to confer such authority upon that board, it is in contravention of the Constitution, and is null and void. The Legislature, how-ever, as this court decided on previous occasions, has power to authorize the state board to asses, for revenue pur-poses, property situate partly in one county and partly in another, or operated in two or more countles, because the assessment of such property may fairly be regarded as an act of adjust-ing and equalizing the valuation of property between different counties of the state. The views herein expressed are not opposed to, but are in harmony with our former decisions, under the Constitution, on the subject of taxa-

DAKOTA DIVORCES.

Iowa Supreme Court Judge Holds They Are no Good.

Moines, Ia., April 16 .- Divorces granted lowans in the Dakotas have no legal standing, according to a decision handed down today by Justice Weaver of the state supreme court, who, in a case before him, ordered the husband to pay his wife one-third of his for-tune, amassed since the decree of di-vorce was granted by the northern

courts.

The decision invalidates many divorces granted in the Dakotas to Iowans. Under it residence in either of the Dakotas for the statutory period is not satisfactory evidence of a bona fide change of residence.

Pleas for Sabbath Observance.

New York, April 18 .- Pleas for more general observance of the Sabbath as a day of rest for laboring men have been made at church services in Mendelssohn hall. The principal speaker, Dr. Wm. B. Huntington of Grace church, declared that with the growing disre-gard for the Sabbath there is fostered great danger of lawlessness which

spreads like wildfire. "We are ceasing," he said, "to be the lawabiding citizens we formerly were. To the American people it is not now a question of how one shall observe the day. The question is how we shall

save the institution.
"There are two bonds holding together the Christians of the world-the holy Bible and the Sabbath day. If one wants to preserve and keep these bonds we must keep the Sabbath as a reminder of Almighty God.

"A day of rest is good for the workmen. Over 90 per cent of the railroad men west of the Mississippi do not have one. It seems as if it were safer for life and limb to be a murderer than to be a brakeman.'
