

CENSUS OF CHURCH STATISTICS.

There still seem to be some misunderstandings and complications in regard to the filling up of the schedules furnished by the census agent for the compilation of statistics of the churches. It was anticipated that some confusion would arise because the forms provided for the various sectarian organizations were not adapted to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. But it was thought that by changing some of the headings and substituting the names of our Church officers for those in the printed schedule, uniform reports could be obtained which would answer the purpose designed. It was conceded by the agent for this Territory that the first two pages of the schedule were adapted to the cream-stanzas of our Wards and Stakes, and that therefore they need not be filled up.

As we have already shown in these columns, the schedules forwarded to the Bishops and Presidents of Stakes by the census agent, with a view to obtaining statistical and other information relative to the churches, are not suited to the peculiar organization of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, for which either a special schedule should have been arranged, or, which would have been better, a special report by the General Church Authorities could have been furnished, with fuller details than those already given, if the particulars required had been explained.

As it is, in order that accurate information may be given and uniformly so far as possible secured, it is necessary that in filling up the blanks forwarded by the census agent, the writers should all understand them alike, and that the changes needed in the form should all correspond. We therefore give below the questions necessary to be answered, with the replies so far as they can be given in one selected case, which will answer as a guide to the Bishops or Presidents of Stakes in filling up the forms. We take Tropic as an example because we happen to be acquainted with the particulars of that Ward, and can give the answers required. The changes made from the original text of the schedule are in italics. Thus, "Ward" is substituted for Parish, "Bishop" for Clergyman, etc. Accuracy is desirable as well as completeness, and the Bishops should bear in mind our former remarks in relation to the necessity of stating the Ward property as such, and not as Church property. This form will of course be filled up to suit the circumstances and conditions of each separate Ward, the particulars of which can only be furnished by the local authorities.

Some of the Bishops filled up the forms as required. But others, so we learn from the agent, went beyond what was agreed upon and attempted to fill up the last two pages of the schedule which were discarded. If they had acted according to instructions and gone no further, there would have been no difficulty. But this put the agent in a quandary, and he considered it necessary that the rest of the Wards should report in similar manner so that uniformity might be secured. He has therefore returned the schedules in many instances and called for further particulars, several of which are not printed in the forms, but are added by him in writing, as follows, under the heading of "Income and Expenditures.—Income for year 1890:"

Voluntary contributions (tithing). Monthly fast day donations. Relief Society donations. Temple donations. Assembly Hall donations. Christmas donations for poor. Sunday School collections.
Here, again, comes confusion from a misconception of our Church as a fair, and from the non-adaptability of them of schedules arranged for other churches. Relief Society donations are not paid to the Bishops, and they do not manage the distributing thereof. Assembly Hall donations are only applicable to the Salt Lake Stake, not to others, and are not a Ward affair. Tithing is not paid into the Wards and is not a general Church fund, and therefore the Bishops of Wards cannot respond to this query. Indeed, it is not required, but is an addition to the schedule, and the Ward Bishops need not puzzle themselves over it, nor over any other question that does not come within their province to answer, but just leave it blank as in other instances where the inquiry does not apply and cannot be properly answered.

There are no accumulated funds in the various Wards, but donations for various purposes are applied to the object for which they were subscribed as soon as received. Time enough will be spent now in fussing over this simple matter, with its additions, and changes, and omissions, and returns. The best way is for the parties who furnish the statistics to fill up the forms according to the best of their ability, and where they find themselves unable to respond, leave the place for the answer blank, or use the word "none" or such other word as will be applicable, seeking to perform what is required by law and then troubling themselves no further on the subject. It is time the matter was settled and done with. There has been already too much difficulty over a very simple affair.

AMERICAN PRESIDENT'S POSITION.
WASHINGTON, 24.—Executive Mansion, 1:30 p. m.—The President continues to take liquid food by mouth as reported in the last bulletin. He is, however, slightly better, in other respects his condition is about the same. Pulse, 104; temperature, 99.2; respiration, 17.

Executive Mansion, 3 p. m.—Dr. Bliss reports the President passed a comfortable night, resting well and sleeping much of the time. His pulse, this morning, ranges about 100.
Executive Mansion, 8:30 a. m.—The President has passed a very good night, awakening at longer intervals than during several nights past. He continues to take liquid food by the mouth with more relish and in such quantity as to tolerate the operation. The patient did not take any anesthetic, and did not seem much weakened by the operation. His pulse, immediately went up to 115, but soon receded to 104. Dr. Reayburn says the result is entirely satisfactory and this information is confirmed by Dr. Hamilton.

Executive Mansion, 1:45 p. m.—Since noon the examination surgeons have lanced the President's inflamed parotid gland and inserted a small quantity of pus. The patient did not take any anesthetic, and did not seem much weakened by the operation. His pulse, immediately went up to 115, but soon receded to 104. Dr. Reayburn says the result is entirely satisfactory and this information is confirmed by Dr. Hamilton.

Executive Mansion, 2:15 p. m.—As stated in the official bulletin sent at 10:30 this morning, the swelling of the President's parotid gland, although not perceptible, had been apparent since yesterday, seemed a little softer, as more careful examination made later in the day, convinced the surgeons that the patient's condition was satisfactory, it was decided to make an incision immediately after the noon examination and the operation was a comparatively trifling one, and was performed by Dr. Hamilton without the use of anesthetic, local or general, but with antiseptic preparation of the shape of carbolic acid spray.

Bliss to Lowell.
According to the opinion of his physicalians, there is no marked change in the President's condition since the last dispatch. At this hour, last past one p. m., there is some indication of increased fever, which they say is in part, caused by the increased heat of the day. He continues to take liquid food, and does not seem troubled by nausea or indigestion.

NEW YORK, 24.—The World's Washington special says: Mrs. Garfield emphatically denies that her husband is or has been delirious and failed to recognize her. She says the story is a wicked invention and that the President's mind is as clear as ever.
A Downy Pillow.
The Herald's Washington correspondent interviewed Mrs. Edson who said: We have ever since we need, but a pillow came lately which issued by the President with great comfort; this pillow is about a yard long, and laid down and divided into four sections, making it quite practical to use. Outside of its double use it is beautifully made, covered with broad cloth, and there came with it several covers of handsomely made linen covers. Somehow or other it seems that scarcely a single thing has been needed in the sick room, except what has been anticipated by somebody outside and we have received it just in time.
Dr. Bliss and Dr. Reayburn.
The Tribune's Washington special says: One of the President's attendants describes one of the manifestations of the President's delirium, which he given as a sample of others, and which seems to show it was by no means an alarming manifestation. The President awoke from sleep with a sticking in his throat, which caused him to cough. Having partially recovered from coughing, he said: "I thought I saw a man over in that corner who coughed like I did, and it annoyed me considerably." He then began talking with Dr. Bliss naturally. "I wish," he said, "that I could take my wife and my child and go to Mexico, or perhaps it would be better to go to the seaside." A friend of Bliss met him this afternoon and made inquiries regarding the several features of the President's treatment, about which the doctors have been so severely criticized. "Doctor," said he, "why don't you move your patient to the White House?" "Because," was the reply, "it would kill him." "Would you move him if you could?" "Of course we would do so, if it were possible; we want to move him. We have a boat all ready for that purpose." "Well, doctor, at one time, when I was in London I was so ill that there was no hope of my recovery. If I stayed there, I was moved and it saved my life." "Would anything have been said about it if you had died?" asked the doctor sarcastically. "Where would we be if this patient should die?" "Now look here, doctor," it was reported, "if the President dies you are to be swung up to a lamp post any way." The writer of course said facetiously, and the doctor, answering in the same vein, said he did not know but that he should be. He then pulled a letter from his pocket, which he had just received, and which contained threats of terrible things to be heaped upon the heads of the attending physicians if they fail to save the President's life.
