Richfield, Sevier Co., Jan. 2.—The preliminary examination of Christian N. Peterson, alias "Dany Chris," charged with grand larceny for stealing \$115 from H. E. Taylor, was held today before Justice Simon Christensen, and resulted in Chris being bound over to the district court in the sum of \$500, in default of which he was committed to the county jail.

SEVIER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

The board of county commissioners

was in session today and transacted the following business:

The sum of \$2,875, heretofore transferred to the general county fund by order of the board, was ordered transferred back to the sinking fund.

The financial reports of the county treasurer, clerk and recorder were examined and approved. The fees of the clerk's office for 1929 exceed those of 1928 by \$560, and those of the recorder for '29 exceed those of '28 by \$143.

Justice of the peace of Aurora, was approved.

Hon. Hans Tuft, of Monroe, was appointed delegate to the meeting of the National Live Stock association at Fort Worth, Texas.

Appropriations for salaries of officers and miscellaneous bills were made to the amount of \$636.45.

Our public schools resumed work today after being closed nearly five weeks on account of the smallpox scare and Christmas vacation.

NEW CITY OFFICERS.

Farmington, Davis County, Jan. 2.—The board of county commissioners was in session today. The usual monthly appropriations were made to cover the pay roll of officers and employees, indigent account, etc.

Francis Bone, road supervisor of the eighth district, and James Varnen of the eighteenth district, were instructed to collect the delinquent poll taxes in their respective districts, or show cause why they do not do so.

William Oakden, constable of Centreville precinct, turned into the county treasury \$13.75, on sales of estrays, and the county treasurer reported as receipts for December, for redemption of land sold for taxes, the sum of \$7.65.

Proof of publication of the ordinance in relation to animals running at large on public highways, and of the delinquent tax list of Davis county, for the year 1929, were duly returned and filed with the county clerk.

Estate of Rosetta Grant; J. H. Grant appointed administrator with bond of \$1,000; order appointing appraisers; order of publication of notice to creditors.

Duncan Kippen vs. Oregon Short Line railway; Motion for new trial denied, provided the plaintiff accept \$500 in full for damages, in lieu of \$1,200 heretofore awarded by jury; otherwise motion for new trial will be granted.

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
