## SURVEYED TO UTAH.

#### Burlington to Extend to Salt Lake as Soon as Route Decided.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Oct. 11 .-- The Burlington railroad has let contracts to build 189 miles of its transcontinental road from Guernsey to the Elk Mountain coal fields in southwestern Wyo-ming. The line has been surveyed to a point in the Wasatch mountains east of Sair Lake, and will be extended to the Utah city as soon as the route through the mountains is decided upon Work ipon the 180 miles will be commenced at once.

#### The Cruel War is On.

Chicago, Oct. 11 .- Executive officers today labored with the problem pre-sented by the cheap excursion rate put in effect by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific, and were compelled to give them up. The Northern Paci-fic announced its rates from St. Paul and asked the Chicago-St. Paul lines to place them on a parity with the Great Northern. Under present condiions this will undoubtedly have to be done.

## Southern Pacific Earnings.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 12.—The Southern Pacific has issued a statement of its earnings for July, the first month of the present fixed year. The gross earnings amounted to \$5,55,453, as against \$4,948,489 for the same period of last year. For the same month the earn-ings of the Southern Pacific of Califor-nia, which includes all the Humitanton nia, which includes all the Huatington lines in the State, except the Central Pacific and South Pacific Coast, were \$1,456,041. In July of last year that company's gross receipts, amounted to \$1,-407,692. The Central Pacific's carnings in July last were \$1,746.111. as against 580,443 for the same period of the year before
