First Battery, N. G. U. Receives Fine Line of Equipment.

The First Light Battery of the National Guard, has just received a fine consignment of equipment from the government, through the governor. It includes, a military range whereon the enlisted men will be taught how to cook for camp

a military range whereon the enlisted men will be taught how to cock for camp consumption, 60 new .38 calibre Colts revolvers, a lot of overceats, complete outfit of kakhi uniforms, ponchos, hav-ersacks, knapsacks, canteens, officers' sabers, spurs, new style of pocket cart-ridgebelts, tan leather pistol holsters, etc. The battery is also to have a bil-liard table, a wooden horse for instruc-tion in mounting and veterinary surgery, and other equipment. The organization will incorporate March 1, with a cap-ital of \$5,000. Then horses will be pur-chased, and trained, the ninmber being gradually increased to 50. As these will be worked on the streets, and the driv-ers enlisted men in the battery, there need be no further trouble in securing horses when wanted. Quarters at the state armory are be-ing put into better condition than ever before, and matters so arranged now that none of the infantry companies above can sweep rubibit from their quarters down the hatchway onto the ordance.
