SALT LAKER DROWNED.

Harry Kendell Falls From Steamer in Northwestern Waters.

Market for Apples, Consul J. H. Worman, of Three Riv-ers, refers to the great facilities pro-vided, both on the Canadian ocean steamers as well as in the Britsh harbors, for the cold storage of Cana-dian fruit, which has given this trade a very large impetus. He calls atten-tion to the fact, however, that, as Canadian apples were rather a short crop this year, American apples would have an unusual opening in the Brit-ish markets if the ships from Ameri-can ports were provided for this carry-ing trade of fruit as well as those sail-ing from Canada.
