

## TELEGRAPHIC, SUCCEEDS ROSEBERRY

Lord Salisbury Called Upon to Form  
a Conservative Cabinet.

A WEEK ADMINISTRATION ENDED.

Irish Members Dissatisfied at the Way  
Their Cause Has Been Ignored.

LONDON, June 23.—It is just announced that the outcome of the deliberations of the cabinet, in consequence of the adverse vote in the House of Commons on Friday, is that Lord Lansbury, the prime minister, has tendered his resignation to the queen. He merely has therefore command of Lord Salisbury, the leader of the conservative party, to witness in connection with the formation of a conservative ministry.

The leading conservatist decides that Marquis of Lansbury will not be called to form a cabinet if Parliament is dissolved. He will insist that the government, before yielding its majority, pass a vote of censure for two months to enable the expenditures for two months to be covered by the conservative party.

The Irish members are extremely angry and dissatisfied. They state that after acting for three years in the interests of the government, they are now compelled to turn upon the suddenly created enemies of the government without passing any of the principal Irish measures.

The effect of the cabinet's dissolution is more marked than the cabinet offices, and those who have the cabinet offices, Lord Rosebery, on his return to town, looked decidedly sprightly, and Lord Tweedmouth, Mr. Morgan and Mr. William Harcourt were in spirits.

**ADVICE FROM JAPAN.**

The Chinese Question Still Leaves Some of Troubles.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—The leader Capo arrived tonight from Yokohama, bringing the following advice:

"YOKOHAMA, June 17.—Although no international complications are apprehended, on Formosa's account, the other Chinese developments are justly regarded with grave anxiety. Count Liang, the Chinese representative at Peking, has received instructions to take part in consultations as to the future policy of Japan in that kingdom, but really, it is believed, to discuss the question of abandoning efforts to make attempts to influence social and political reforms into the correct machinery."

Until a few weeks ago the dominating influence of the Japanese was successfully maintained, but since the apprehension of Japan's influence to increase, the Chinese have concluded themselves that Russia alone is to be feared and courted; and that they may safely repeat their pledge to the United States. This advice is paid to Count Liang, and the government leaders are seeking to ingratiate themselves with the Russian diplomatic agent by every conceivable device.

The outcome is full of difficulties. If the Japanese government gives up the test, it will not only be vehemently assailed at home, but will leave China at the mercy of Russia, and that empire will have no scruples in securing itself all the advantages of the situation.

The Japanese authorities are making strenuous efforts to prevent the spread of cholera in Taku and other cities through the troops returning from Korea. 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The Japanese authorities are gradually withdrawn from Manchuria, they are followed by lawless bands of armed Chinese, who treat the unprotected inhabitants with merciless cruelty. One hundred thousand persons, according to the latest reports of the Chinese government, have been massacred, and having no ambitions in the Chinese authorities, have applied for permission to emigrate to Japan.

**English Bismarckian Memorial.**

LONDON, June 23.—A bimillennial memorial has been signed by numbers of the leading bankers, merchants and manufacturers doing business in the country. It first refers to the recent anti-slavery movement, in which Bismarck is justly described as a growing agitator. It then proceeds to relate that, instead of the commercial supremacy of Great Britain and the financial ascendancy of London having predominance, as the change in the currency in 1870, it was succeeded.

**INTERVIEW WITH EX-CHIEF.**

TWO KILLED, OTHERS INJURED BY ANGLO-CHINESE.

CHICAGO, June 23.—By the explosion of a mine in the warehouse district, Chicago, last night, two men were killed and fifteen were dangerously injured.

It was the homogeneous run of the day, in its opening extension to Milwaukee, and the mine was owned by the Anglo-Chinese. The cause of the explosion was the order of the evening.
