

TELEGRAPHIC. THE TRACKS CLEAR.

The blockade at the Chicago Stock Yards Fully Lifted.

CATTLE TRAINS AGAIN RUNNING.

Railroad Companies Notified That the Stock Yard Officials Are Ready to Resume Business.

CHICAGO, July 11.—The blockade that has lasted for almost a week at the stock yards was fully lifted last night. Northern, Morris & Co., and a train of cattle east and Swift and Armour each sent out a train of dressed meat. Fully three hundred car loads of meat have been taken out of the packing district to wagons partly guarded by police and much of it is claimed has been shipped from the city by rail. Late last evening the stock yard officials notified the several railroad companies that their tracks were clear and that they would resume all shipping stock today.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF ANARCHISTIC MEETING.

In pursuit of their efforts to stamp out the anarchist sentiment, at least to prevent its growth to a dangerous stage, the stock yard police last night arrested by a company of sailors from the U.S. Revenue cutter, the "Frigate," and Center Avenue, and the assistance of 500, was dispersed without trouble. The utterances of the speakers were of a decidedly insidious nature, and when the audience had been fully seated, the hall was thrown into a fitful expression of bated breath for the police had.

SOVEREIGN'S STRIKE ORDER.

The Movement Required an ED-ADvised by Knights.

NEW YORK, July 11.—The order of general Master Workmen Sovereign calling all the Knights of Labor in the United States in order to strengthen the strike against the railroads, and anything that can be done to assist in the organization of the district assembly, they will respond, is issued, while authority in the call, and action, was given to the Knights to do whatever is necessary, although all that it will have no influence on the result. In Brooklyn, however, the men are not well pleased, and Master Workmen Batty of district 12, which includes all the railroads in that city, has issued a protest.

"It will not be obeyed. I must say that the movement is ill-advised. They are not fighting employers now, but the government, and in such a struggle we have no part. But even if that element did not appear to be right, we have to bear in mind that it would be the height of folly to take such a step. There are five men out of work here now ready to take the place of any man who leaves his work, so nothing can be accomplished by a sympathetic strike in the east."

STEAK Dead While on Duty.

CHICAGO, July 11.—A Private of Company C, First regiment, A. S. G., was instantly killed last night on the Union Central tracks while on guard duty. He was struck by the engine and his body was entirely mangled.

LEGAL PROCEEDINGS.

A Case of Contempt Against a Sheriff's Lawyer.

CHICAGO, July 11.—The first proceedings not in contempt against the strikers in the United States circuit court under the injunction issued by General Order No. 10, were commenced today by District Attorney Mitchell. The defendant is D. M. Delaney, who is charged with interfering with trains on the Santa Fe road in violation of the injunction. Affidavits were filed alleging that he had interfered several times and endeavored to prevent the employees from performing their duties.

Why Gov. Marquette Was Resigned.

HANOVER, N.H., July 11.—The recent removal of Colonel Alfred Gurn Martin, governor of Lower Alton, N.H., from office was due to the efforts of his conduct in reference to President Dixie Hinde Ransom. The governor was alleged to have been grossly immoral, but the specific charge preferred against him was that he had attempted to get himself elected to the Senate by the American Legion. Forced to Death.

South Haven, Mich., July 11.—The steam barge Myrtle M. that was burned in yesterday, was turned over to Captain and owner, who had been in love with a man named Daley and her last written message to her mother indicated that she had desired him. A warrant was sworn for him and he was brought in yesterday and held over to the grand jury, who said, "Tell young people to take warning from me. Don't place your affections on a green tree. I love Mr. Daley yet, tell me that life was not worth living, for he loves me I could not win."

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Attempts to Break a Train.

DETROIT, Mich., July 11.—An attempt was made to break a freight train at the bridge between the two stations of Highland Park and Highland Park. A small fireman discovered his switch open in the morning and took out the rails. The members of the A. E. C. are highly indignant and have started to guard railroad property.

Assault on the Congress.

CHICAGO, July 11.—Edward T. Neumann today received the Democratic nomination for Congress for the First district, to succeed Congressman Durbin.

Attorney for Plaintiff.

DEBS AND OTHERS INDICTED

Charged With Conspiracy to Commit Unlawful Acts.

MADE PLATE OF TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS—The Princesses Retained—The Defendants.

CHICAGO, July 10.—The federal grand jury, after receiving the testimony of Judge Grosscup this afternoon, returned indictments against Eugene V. Debs, president of the A. F. of L.; George W. Howard, its vice president; Jayhur Kellher, secretary, and J. W. Rogers, one of its directors, and charged them with the same were arrested.

They are charged with conspiracy to commit an unlawful act, an attempt to obstruct the progress of the United States mail.

Judged in the indictment with the president of the A. F. of L. was James Morris, the Rock Island striker who threw the switch which derailed a mail train at Blue Island on the night of June 26th.

Debs, Howard, Kellher and Rogers were arrested by the office of District Attorney Mitchell, immediately after their arrest, and after a brief hearing were released on bail by Judge Grosscup, their bonds being \$10,000 each.

Shortly after a regular Marshal arrived with Debs' bonds, Debs was arrested into Mr. Mitchell's private office. He was accompanied by Theodore Debs, his brother, who was with him when the arrest was made. There were in the office also Mr. Debs' wife, Mrs. Debs, and Mr. Mitchell, and these were soon joined by Judge Grosscup, who had been summoned to take bail.

It was not until Deputy Logan came to the office that the marshal was allowed to leave. The marshal, in a short time, returned with Attorney W. L. Blaine, who had been retained to defend the prisoners.

At 6 o'clock Deputy Logan appeared with Rogers and Vice President Howard.

It was 7:30 p. m. before Clerk Barnes appeared and the half hour was legally occupied. The bondsmen are Adelmann, William, Fosselius, who qualified to the sum of \$200,000, and Williamson, John, who qualified to \$50,000 bonds, being to the sum of \$10,000 each.

Principals of the Strike.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Judge Bailey, of the 10th circuit, adjourned today afternoon that he would return to issue a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Mr. Debs. This apparently makes certain the hanging of Prinsberg on Friday, July 13th. About the only hope for Prinsberg's intercession by Government Agents.

Nights of Labor Called Out.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Knights of Labor throughout the country, numbering nearly 1,000,000 men, have been called out to strike the cause of organized labor, General Master Workmen Sovereign issued an order that every member of the Knights of Labor shall be held in the same position in the new cabinet, but those who know how long he will hold the place, he may leave him.

There was a public meeting of Knights at Honolulu July 2. The new constitution was demanded. Old troubles were mentioned.

It was asserted at Honolulu that William C. Cushing, president of the Knights, informed the American Legion Knights club \$10,000 to come over the queen.

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
