Suit for Damages on a Contract-Divorce Taken Under Advisement.

Ogden, May 8 .- The damage suit brought by Henry Marks et al. against Richard Douglass et al. to recover \$1,-965.35 is now on trial in the district court before Judge Howell and a jury. The prosecution is endeavoring to prove by a number of witnesses that the de-fendant agreed and contracted to furfendant agreed and contracted to fur-nish the plaintiffs with 91,000 pounds of wool at 18 cents per pound, but only furnished 51,650 pounds under the con-tract, and that by cause of their fail-ure to perform their part of the con-tract plaintiffs were damaged in the sum asked for.

Campbell was heard by his honor, the testimony showing that defendant deserted his wife and left the state and has failed to provide her vith the necessaries of life. #### Light Co, Increases Price of Lights to **Pay City License**

Special Correspondence. Provo, May 8 .- The following letter was received by the city council last evening:

"Provo City, May 4, 1906.

"Provo City, May 4, 1906, "To the City Council: "Heretofore this year we paid you the license levied against us as against other merchants in your city. Now you have placed in the hands of your city attorney the collection of another license fee against us and under date of the 1st instant, he demanded pay-ment, saying that he desired to call our attention to some ordinances which you passed in December, 1905, requiring us to pay this new and addirequiring us to paysod in December, 1905, requiring us to pay this new and addi-tional license fee. We have not ex-amined the ordinances, but undoubt-edly you have been advised that you have the legal right to make various lincense charges and other assessments at will against us. We have this day handed your recorders handed your recorder our check No. 2.326 of even date for the sum of \$250. 2.226 of even date for the sum of \$200, payable to the order of Provo City, in full settlement of your demands for all license fees to date for A. D. 1906, of which you have as yet given us notice or of which we have any knowl-

"During all the years we have op-erated in Provo City we have fur-hished currents for lights for its crated in Provo City we have fur-hished currents for lights for its streets and public places at a price less than the value of the current and at an actual loss to us. Your lack of appreciation of this attitude on our part, as evidenced by your assess-ment of these various license fees, compels us to make a new price for your current, a price which, though ho more than is charged at most other places, will prove sufficient, we hope. to enable us to meet your license fee demands. Houce, beginning with and after June 1, 1996, and until you are hotified of a further change, our charge to you for each and every 32-candle power light for the city's use only, for lighting streets and public places, conditions as to furnishing them to remain as now, will be \$1 per month. We hope this change will enable us to continue our present ser-vice to the inhabitants of this city, without increasing the price to them. without increasing the price to them. This letter you will regard as a no-The letter you will regard as a no-tice of price per current, etc., as above set forth. Yours very truly, "The Electric Company, by J. J. Nunn, Manager."

This letter was in response to a demand for a license, under the ordi-hance requiring a license from electric light companies, express and telephone companies. The advance in the com-pany's price of light is fifty per cent, the price now being 66 2-3 cents a light. The communication was referred to the committee on electric light.
