

## ARE THESE TWO WOMEN INSANE?

Esther Mitchell and Maud Creffield May Not be Tried For Murder.

### MAY BE LUNACY COMMISSION.

Mitchell Girl Asked for Week in Which to Plead—Other Said "Not Guilty."

Seattle, Wash., July 23.—It is possible that Esther Mitchell and Maud Creffield, charged jointly with murder in the first degree for the killing of George Mitchell, the Holy Roller leader, will never be brought to trial on a criminal charge. The women were arraigned before Superior Judge Frater this morning and the latter stated from the bench that he was in favor of a commission being called to examine into the mental condition of the women and sending them to an insane asylum if they were found to be insane.

There was evidence introduced into the trial of George Mitchell, said the court, "which went to show that these women were insane at one time and that they were confined in state institutions because of this fact. While I have no positive knowledge in connection with this matter, I am inclined to believe that the women will be committed to an insane asylum if it can be determined that these women are insane. I believe a commission would be the proper tribunal to pass upon this question, as it would save the county much time and money."

Pursuing Atty. Mackintosh is opposed to any commission being called, as he claims that it will cost the county nearly as much as a trial on a criminal charge. Mr. Mackintosh does not believe that the attorneys for the defendants will take any such step on their own account. Atty. Barker, who will probably defend Esther Mitchell, declined to express any opinion in connection with the suggestion of Judge Frater. Mrs. Creffield as yet has no attorney.

### ROCKEFELLER'S RETURN.

No Attempt Will be Made to Arrest Him.

Findlay, O., July 23.—No attempt will be made to arrest John D. Rockefeller when he arrives in New York Friday. Atty. Troup of Bowling Green, O., representing Mr. Rockefeller, was here today and received the permission of Prosecutor Davis and Probate Judge Barker to enter Rockefeller's appearance in the latter's name. This was accordingly done. Sheriff Graves still has the warrant, but on account of the turn of events, will not attempt to serve it. The warrant was issued recently upon an information filed by Prosecutor Davis, charging Mr. Rockefeller and the Standard Oil company with an alleged violation of the Valentine anti-trust law.

### DOWIE MAKES FORMAL DEMAND ON VOLIVA.

Chicago, July 23.—John Alexander Dowie has made a formal demand on Wilbur Glenn Voliva, present head of the Christian Catholic Apostolic church, for a detail of the charges in writing against Dowie's moral character. Voliva today refused to comply with the demand. Dowie wishes to obtain in writing every charge which has been made against his moral character, so that he may defend himself, according to his attorneys, but has been unsuccessful.

### SEEING OPERATION KILLED HIM.

Tacoma, Wash., July 23.—Judge William Harris, the pioneer attorney of Tacoma, visited the Red Cross hospital yesterday and watched Dr. Sargent perform a trifling surgical operation which sickened him. A spell of vomiting followed which resulted in the bursting of the esophagus, causing death this morning. Judge Harris was about 55 years old. His daughter Christine, a resident of Tacoma in San Francisco a few weeks ago.

### IRWIN MILLER DEAD.

Springfield, Ohio, July 23.—Irwin Miller, a son of the late Justice S. H. Miller of the U. S. supreme court, died yesterday, aged 49 years. He was a native of Keokuk, Iowa, and a graduate of Cornell university. In 1896 he was secretary and disbursing officer to the Sioux Indian commission, which regulated the purchase of millions of acres from the Indians. He was a judge of awards at the Chicago world's fair.

### FORGED U. P. STOCK.

Bogus Certificate for 50 Shares Common is Discovered.

New York, July 23.—Discovery of a forged certificate for 50 shares of common stock of the Union Pacific railroad was announced this evening by George W. Ely, secretary of the stock exchange. According to Ely, the certificate is numbered 4,454 and dated Sept. 14, 1905. It is in the name of Marvin J. Hannahan, bearing what purports to be the signatures of E. H. Harriman and Alexander Miller, without official title and the seal of the Union Pacific company. Mr. Ely said that it is not known whether or not there are any more forged certificates in circulation. The price of Union Pacific common stock is \$147.25 per share.

### ABOLISHMENT OF RELIEF KITCHENS ADVISED.

San Francisco, July 23.—After a careful inspection of the relief kitchens where meals are served for 15 cents to refugees, Rudolph Spreckels, a director of the San Francisco relief and Red Cross corporation, has reported to the relief committee advising the abolishment of the relief kitchens. Mr. Spreckels says that he found conditions in the kitchens very bad. He declared that the quality of food served is very poor and that he believes considerable profit is being made off the meals by the contractors. "I visited a number of the soup kitchens," said Mr. Spreckels, "and found the conditions very bad. The food supplied is of a very inferior quality. The kitchens are not properly guarded and the wind and dust blow through them."

### MURDERER DOESN'T SUCCEED IN KILLING HIMSELF.

Helena, July 23.—With a gaping wound in his left side and muscles of his left arm torn and shattered by the force of the shotgun charge with which he attempted to kill himself yesterday after killing his wife, Charles D. Schmidt, lying upon a bed of pain at a local hospital, today expressed to newspaper men an interest that he had not succeeded in killing himself. No word of sorrow for his murderous act came from his lips. He said he was sorry he was not also dead. Then he told a long story of alleged domestic infidelity culminating in his discovery of a fatal letter from his wife. He said that a former Assistant admiral which led to the tragedy. The doctor in attendance says Schmidt will not die. Corone Bennett will hold an inquest into the death of Mrs. Schmidt tonight.

### FOUR MEN KILLED.

By Explosion in a Powder and Dynamite House. Mount Union, Pa., July 23.—Four men were killed and one injured today in an explosion in the powder and dynamite house belonging to Jesse O. McClain, near Robertsville, Huntingdon county. The magazine was situated about half way between Robertsville and Woodville, the southern terminus of the East Broad Top railroad, and from it the miners daily obtained the necessary explosives for use in the mines. Today a number of miners went to the powder house and a moment later the whole place was blown to pieces. The cause of the explosion is unknown; but it is supposed that one of the men who entered the building was smoking and through carelessness ignited the powder.

### RAILROAD TAXES.

Michigan Gains an Important Point in Great Railway Cases.

Lansing, Mich., July 23.—The state has gained an important point in its last of the great railway cases by a decision of the supreme court this afternoon in the case of the state against the Michigan Central to collect \$1,600,000 in back taxes, claimed to be due the state under an original charter of the corporation and covering the years from 1854 to 1892. Suit was brought before Judge West, in Ingham county circuit court, to collect on the grounds that the company had made a fraudulent report as to the amount of property it had, subject to taxation. The company filed a demurrer alleging that the state was barred by the statute of limitations. The court below overruled the demurrer and the company appealed. The supreme court sustained Judge West.

## GREAT NORTHERN FAST MAIL WRECKED

Locomotive, Mail, Baggage and Smoking Cars Buried in Diamond Lake.

### SEVEN LIVES WERE LOST.

Rails Spread, Caused by Sun Kinks—Accident Occurred at Camden, Wash.

Spokane, Wash., July 24.—At least seven lives were lost, seven persons were seriously injured and a score of others sustained cuts and bruises in a wreck of the fast mail train on the Great Northern a mile and a quarter east of Spokane, at 4:18 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when the locomotive, mail, baggage and smoking cars left the rails on emerging from the tunnel and plunged over the 70-foot embankment, were submerged in the waters of Diamond lake.

Spreading rails, probably caused by sun kinks, is given as the cause.

### INJURED.

Among the seriously injured are: John Lord, Seattle, agent, left hand cut, face bruised and back hurt, Walter R. Ross, news agent, Seattle, wrist cut, Henry Byvoorn, Minot, N. D., badly burned and hurt internally.

Immediately after the smoker struck the water there was a blinding flash, which spread over the part of the car not submerged, and a fire followed.

The sudden plunge was so terrific that several cars on the rear of the train were wrenched and twisted, and the fact that the couplings did not break on the dining, tourist and sleeping cars was the only thing that averted even greater loss of life.

Engineer Munson and fireman Bell, together stuck to the pole, and it is believed, too, that the locomotive is in from 100 to 500 feet of water. Two divers made half a dozen attempts to find the locomotive, but they were not successful.

W. S. Hinneman, a contractor for construction work on the O. R. & N., broke through a window to escape from the burning and half submerged smoker. Mr. Hinneman said: "We were coming at a fearful speed through that tunnel, and we were passing over it wondering if the engine had lost its senses, driving at that rate of speed with a sharp curve ahead. I think we must surely have been going 45 miles an hour."

An idea of the depth of Diamond lake at the point of the disaster may be gained by the experience of W. M. McPadden and Charles Crawl, who accompanied the relief train. Speaking of their experience, McPadden said: "When we arrived there, we secured a row boat and an oarsman. Then we tied a rope around our bodies reaching 25 feet on each side of the boat. We each went over one side with instructions to locate the engine. We were let down the full length of the rope and groped around in that depth for it, but could not touch the top. We could not find it, and there is no telling how deep it must have sunk below the surface. We were told to hunt for the engineer and fireman, but not being able to get down deep enough to locate the engine, we were unable to get the bodies."

"We had better luck with the smoker. The forward end of the car was all that went under. It hung on the bank and we went down on the outside of the car and wrenched the body of Mr. Curtiss loose. I think some one pulled his body out of the water later."

Relief trains brought the dead and injured to Spokane.

### ARMAMENT OF THE BATTLESHIP DREADNAUGHT

London, July 23.—The first official announcement regarding the battleship Dreadnaught is contained in a white book on naval construction the past year which was issued tonight. Besides the 12-inch guns announced, this Dreadnaught will have 27 12-pound quick firing anti-torpedo boat guns and five submerged torpedo tubes. In the arrangement of armament six of the big guns are mounted in pairs on the center line of the ship and the remaining four are mounted in pairs as broadsides. Thus eight 12-inch guns, or 8 per cent of the plain armament, can be fired on either broadside, and four and possibly six 12-inch guns or 50 per cent can be fired simultaneously ahead or astern.

In view of the modern potentialities of torpedoes, and considering especially the chances of a torpedo attack toward the end of a battle, the anti-torpedo boat guns are widely situated, so that the whole of them cannot be disabled by one heavy shell.

Special attention has been paid to protection from submarine explosions. After thorough consideration from every point of view, the naval architects, experts had no difficulty in arriving at a decision to adopt turbines, which are considered more advantageous for sea-going speed, possessing sufficient stopping and turning power and for purposes of quick and easy maneuvering.

The speed is designed to be 21 knots. The bunker capacity is 2,500 tons, with which the Dreadnaught can steam 1,800 sea miles at economical speed at 22.50 miles an hour. The estimated cost of the Dreadnaught, including guns, is \$5,987,485.

### KILLED IN A THRESHING.

Los Angeles, July 23.—A special to the Times from Santa Maria says: Caleb Townes, a threshing machine engineer, met death in a horrible manner near Santa Maria today. While the big machine was in motion Townes attempted to lower the smokestack hood. He lost his footing, fell between the piston rod and eccentric and was fatally mangled before the machine could be stopped. His left leg was denuded of flesh from the thigh down. He lived 30 minutes without losing consciousness.

### COL. BALLINGER DEAD.

Seattle, July 23.—Col. Richard Henry Ballinger, aged 83, father of former Mayor R. A. Ballinger of this city, died at 1 o'clock this morning of heart disease. Col. Ballinger served with gallantry in the Civil war and was with Grant at Vicksburg.

### OREGON LAND FRAUDS.

Defendant Hoge Taken Suddenly and Seriously Ill.

Portland, Or., July 23.—All unexpectedly today the case against M. G. Hoge and Charles Nickell, in the federal court, came to a stop by word that Hoge was lying in bed, and until death in a comatose condition. A recess was taken to investigate his case. Heney gave notice that unless he was taken to St. Vincent's hospital and Dr. McKenzie agreed and gave such testimony, and Hoge did not appear, he would ask for an order for fixing his bail.

### STANDARD OIL PROSECUTION.

### AN INHUMAN MONSTER.

Charles Anderson Tries to Throw Daughter's Body Out of Window.

New York, July 23.—Charged with removing the body of his daughter from a coffin and attempting to throw it out of a window, Charles Anderson was called an "inhuman monster" by Magistrate Moss in police court yesterday.

"My only regret," said the magistrate, "is that there is no adequate punishment for the crime. Civilization has grown out of such an outrage against decency, and the statutes provide no penalty in keeping with the malignancy and horror of your act."

Witnesses said Anderson went to the home of his wife, on Park Ave. on Sunday when the funeral was being arranged, drove his wife and other mourners out of the place, then deliberately tried to throw the body of his daughter out of a window. He was sent to the workhouse on default of \$500 bail.

### CHICAGO DIVORCE SUITS.

Practice of Suppressing News of Them To be Discontinued.

Chicago, July 23.—The growing practice of suppression of divorce suits resulting yesterday in the issuance of an order by Circuit Court Clerk James J. Gray, notifying his deputies that all bills for divorce not given separate maintenance must be given out for publication the day they are filed, whether service has been obtained on the defendant or not.

An order forbidding the indiscriminate suppression of divorce suits was issued by Charles Vail, clerk of the superior court.

In some instances lawyers seeking to save their clients from notoriety in suits for divorce have deliberately given fictitious names in the bills filed, or if the real names were given they induced the deputy clerks to suppress the bill, "for service."
