## A ROYAL WEDDING.

Marriage of Princess Victoria of Teck  
to the Duke of York.

### A TRIUMPHANT PROCESSION.

Street Fairly Decorated and Crowded  
with Spectators—Vast  
Presents.

WEDDING, July 5.—The marriage of the Duke of York (Prince George of Wales) and Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, took place at 12:30 in the Chapel Royal at St. James's palace. The wedding was brilliant, attended by a large gathering of British and continental royalty and the highest nobility. The weather was beautiful. A great crowd gathered along the route from Buckingham Palace to the garden entrance of St. James's palace. The processions were profuse, and the royal ceremony culminated in pomp and splendor such as recent coronation at the British court.

The royal party left Buckingham Palace in four processions, the household and distinguished guests, that name the Duke of York and his supporting the prince of Wales and the Duke of Luxembourg; third, the wife accompanied by her father, the Duke of Cambridge; fourth, the Prince of Wales who had the honor accompanied by Princess Teck, her younger son and the grand duke of Hesse.

This was suitably adorned with palms and flowers, carpeted with crimson. Drawing room curtains were hung by the ladies, the gentlemen being in full liver dress.

The arrival of the bride into the Chapel consisted of the archbishop of Canterbury, the bishop of London, the dean of the Chapel Royal, the archbishop, the bishop of Rochester, the vicar of Kensington. The bridesmaids were Princesses Victoria and Mary of Wales, Princesses Alexandra and Beatrice of Edinburgh, Princesses Louise and Alice, Princesses Constance, Princess Victoria of Schleswig-Holstein and Princess Louise. The Archbishops of Canterbury, assisted by other clergy, performed the ceremony. The bride was given away by her father.

The marriage service, with the marriage choral, Pater Noster, composed by the composer by Praeber and sang by the Chapel Royal choir. In the shade of trees near Joseph Banks's Grotto, Perfect Love, a choral song at the close of the dute and dances.

This was given away by the bridegroom with open arms.

After congratulating the bridal pair drove to the city and proceeded by rail to Paddington. The lord mayor and aldermen met the party at the station, the royal progress was through festively decorated and crowded streets throughout.
