### LOCAL BRIEFS.

A son was born yesterday to the wife of ex-Governor H. M. Wells.

The Council of Jewish Women will hold a special meeting tonight after the lecture in the Jewish Temple.

Governor Cutler entertained the members of his staff and officers of the National Guard at his residence on Thursday evening.

Messadems Waters and Hirschman and Miss Rose Levy will give a card party next Tuesday afternoon, by the B. and B. lodge rooms, Auerbach building.

The Federation of Labor will discuss at this evening's meeting, the proposition to send three delegates to the Ministerial association, and to admit three delegates to the Federation from the association.

A special meeting of members of the University club for the discussion of amendments to the by-laws, will be held next Saturday evening, at the club house. The proposed amendments provide for a reclassification of membership.

Suit has been filed in the district court by Dr. J. Paul's Episcopal church, against the administrator of the estate of John Siddoway, deceased, to recover \$55 alleged to be due for medical and surgical services rendered by him for Mr. Siddoway during his last illness.

Rev. Lawrence R. Ridgely, formerly rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church in this city, and of late rector at Los Angeles, will return next month to missionary work in China, where he was engaged after leaving his church in this city. Mr. Ridgely will teach in St. Paul's school at Shanghai.

Judgment for plaintiff by default has been rendered by Judge Ritchie in the case of S. McDowell against the Bingham Canyon Mining company for the sum of \$3,555.33. The action was brought to recover for services rendered by plaintiff and John C. Dugan, whose claim was assigned to plaintiff.

Emma Brant was sentenced to 25 days in jail by Judge Diehl yesterday afternoon for vagrancy and drunkenness, to which charges she pleaded guilty. Several years ago she was one of the prettiest young women in the city, but a desire for drink has brought her into disgrace. She belongs to a good family.

Judge Diehl yesterday afternoon discharged James A. Luke after giving him a severe reprimand. Luke was arrested for leaving his home on April 10, and for being drunk on the city and county building grounds. As he was leaving the court room Luke said he guessed he would have to buy a hitching strap now and the judge informed him that he would either have to do that or pay a fine.

One of the depositors of the Commercial National bank of this city, brought in yesterday the remains of \$150 in burnt bills, the result of an accidental fire where she had left the cash. The bank is sending the remains to the treasury department at Washington to have the destroyed money replaced by new bills.

Citizens who have been in Denver report that the architects are fairly turning away business, and there is a rapid building going on over town that is astonishing visitors. One reason for so many new residences is the fact that new residents have an aversion to taking old houses for fear of burglars who have been living there.

The big Raymond & Whitecomb excursion party of 100 members in this city, distinguished themselves by hiring 20 carriages and wagons for driving about town at a dollar a head, instead of peddling their "Seeing Salt Lake" cards. They claimed they could see more in carriages than when cooped up in street cars, and then carriages could take them where cars could not.

Utah Lake continues to rise, and is reported as flooding considerable territory. It is claimed that there is nearly twice as much water available at the present time for valley irrigation as there was a year ago at this time, and the canals are being cleaned out preparatory to filling the water on April 15 next. So the Salt Lake valley will have an abundant supply of water the coming season.

The ladies of the Third Presbyterian church will give a reception this evening from 8 to 11 o'clock, in the new Gulton chapel at Eleventh South and Eleventh East streets. A good program has been prepared, and a large attendance is expected. The Third church will occupy the building for regular worship next Sunday morning, and the old property on Emerson avenue, will be disposed of.

Landlord Fred Wey has been employing two girls at the Wilson who looked so much alike that he found it impossible to distinguish between them. One was a stenographer, and the other presided over the news stand. The services of one were unsatisfactory and Mr. Wey determined to let her go, but as luck would have it, he discharged the wrong girl, and so had to let both out. It has left him in more or less of a maze ever since.

George Savage has returned from a six weeks' absence in the east. Mr. Savage returned from New York via Havana and Galveston. He says the Cuban capital has a wonderful climate, the thermometer varying only between 70 and 90 degrees the year around, and he really would like to live in such a climate. But good hotels and restaurants are scarce articles, and there is money to be made by Americans who are ready to go down to Havana and engage in that business.

### WHAT DID THEY WANT?

Burglars Attempt to Break Into Surveyor General's Office.

It was reported to the police yesterday that an attempt had been made to burglarize Ellison's jewelry stand in the entrance to the Templeton block, but it now develops that the burglars were trying to gain entrance to the office of the United States surveyor-general, which has double doors leading into the entrance way of the building. It seems that the burglars inserted a chisel between the two doors and pried them apart so as to break the fastenings loose.

The burglars must have been scared away because there was nothing to indicate that they entered the office, everything there being in the same condition as when the office was closed on Wednesday evening. When the doors were opened yesterday several screws fell out of the lock and an investigation showed that the doors had been tampered with. It is quite a mystery to the police officers why any one should attempt to burglarize the office, as there is nothing there which would be of particular value to the common run of burglars.

Henry Wright, pardon; convicted of grand larceny and burglary at Salt Lake City, May 29, 1900, and sentenced to eight years for larceny; one year for burglary.

Charles A. Larsen, rehearing for parole; convicted on the charge of rape at Logan July 21, 1897, and sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary.

Richard McLaughlin, pardon; convicted Feb. 10, 1905, at Beaver, on the charge of assault with intent to do great bodily harm, and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary.

Vedo Delvecchio, commutation of sentence; convicted of rape at Salt Lake City Nov. 6, 1901, sentenced to six years.

Frank Wilson, pardon; sentenced April 28, 1904, at Provo on the charge of arson and given five years.
