

DETAILS OF THE LATEST FIGHT.

How Gen. Lawton's Command Captured Santa Cruz.

FILIPINOS LOSE HEAVILY.

Each American Shells the Town—Only Six American Soldiers Receive Wounds.

Manila, April 10.—Gen. Lawton has captured Santa Cruz, at the extreme end of the lake, and drove the enemy and was accompanied by a Chinaman named Pan Wah, into the mountains. American loss, six wounded. The whole lost sixty-eight killed and forty wounded.

Santa Cruz was the Filipino stronghold in Lake Laguna de Bay, and it fell into the hands of Gen. Lawton's expedition after some sharp, quick fighting, forcing one of the most important and important battles of the war. The plan of the American commanders worked perfectly with the exception that the progress of the expedition was delayed by the difficult navigation of the river.

About 1,500 picked men, commanded by Gen. Lawton, on account of the illness of Gen. King, partly surrounded the city, while the remainder of the troops, under the command of Capt. Grant of the 10th Infantry, shelled the city and captured it.

Gen. Lawton and staff accompanied the troops, sometimes leading sharpshooters, and at other times, in the rear, usually resulting in the complete rout of the enemy with the smallest amount of damage to the city and almost none to the Americans.

The expedition started from San Pedro Macuti at dusk on Saturday, intent on capturing Santa Cruz to prevent the enemy from using it as a base for operations in the Laguna de Bay, and to capture the city and the surrounding country.

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FURTHER INQUIRY INTO THE BEEF.

WALKER FAVORS THE MEAT

Washington, April 10.—The army court of beef inquiry resumed its session at 10 o'clock today, with Admiral John D. Walker, president of the board, and the other members of the board.

Walker, who had been absent from the court since the previous day, returned today and presided over the session.

The court heard the testimony of a witness who had been present at the time the beef was distributed to the troops.

The witness testified that the beef was of a poor quality and that it had a strong, acrid, and sour smell.

Walker, in his testimony, admitted that the men who had to eat the beef did not like it, but he stated that it was the best that could be obtained under the circumstances.

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SOME OFFICIAL SHORTCOMINGS.

Proceedings Before the Maelz Legislative Committee, New York.

THE TRIAL OF QUAY BEGAN.

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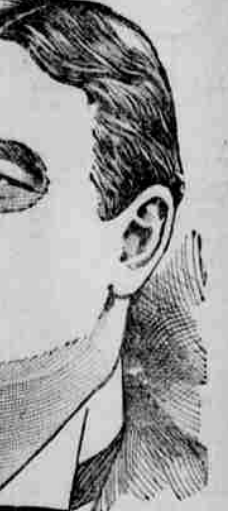
