William Howard and H. A. Fow-ler sewed up the large wound on Dan's arm, and Doctor Pearson sewed up the large wound on George's shoulder and the wound in the breast. It will grow on all kinds of soil. All kinds of stock will eat it greedly, and is very rich in nutrition value or flesh forming ingredients. It is easily cul-tivated, since it is suited to ult soils. It is sown in the early spring in the same way as other grass seeds, and since it is rather slow to start and does not make much growth the first year, is well suited to sow with grain for a nurse crop. Moderate grazing and overgrazing, NOTES FROM A PEACH ORCHARD.

In the northern part of Monroe county, N. Y., three miles from Morton and one-half mile from the shore of Lake one-half mile from the shore of Lake Ontario, there is a ridge of land about one mile long and one-half mile wide on which the cultivation of peaches has been so successful that it is known as the "Peach Belt." The soil on this ridge is sandy and naturally well drained, the latter a prime necessity in the cultivation of peaches, even to the sub-soil.
