The owners of the Smith drug store stand petitioned for the privilege of maintaining their stand at

move after having recently purchased the stand for \$290. The two men ap-peared before the committee last night

were paying the drug company and the owner of the building \$25 per month rent for the privilege of using the city's sidewalk. That fact did not look good

WESTERN MARKET LETTER.

Kansas City, Mo., Menday, May 23.---Good many fed weetern steers came in last week, most of them light weights, 1,050 to 1,250 pounds. They sold from \$4.35 to \$4.65, which was 10 to 15 cents advance over previous week. One bunch of 1,350 pound Colorados sold at \$4.85, and a load of toppy Oklahoma steers, 1,460 pounds, brought \$5.10, the best price of the week at Kansas City.

Colorado feeders, 900 to 950 pounds, sold at \$4 to \$4.15. Texus and Oklahoma stockers, \$3.35 to \$4; and a big string of Texas stock calves, 300 to 266 pounds.
