SAN DOMINGO'S DEBTS TO BE PAID

Secy. of War Will Present Names To President of Republic Who Will Select Collectors

ARRANCEMENT IS TEMPORARY.

Money Collected, Not Turned Over to Deminican Govt to be Held Awalting Action of Senate on Treaty.

March 28 .- President Washington, Possevelt has decided to accept the proposition of the Dominican government, made through Minister Dawson, for the control of the finances of that republic with a view to setting aside a portion of the revenues of the republic for the payment of its debts.

The attitude of the United States government is shown in the following instructions given to Acting Secy.

White House Washington, D. C., March 38, 1905.

"The Acting Secretary of State-I have carefully considered the following cablegram from Minister Dawson; Secretary of State, Washington:

Under pressure of foreign creditors and domestic peril. Dominican government offers to nominate a citizen of the United States receiver of southern ports pending satisfactory protocol; four northern ports to be administered under award. Forty-five per cent of the total shall go to Dominican govern-ment, 55 to be deposited in New York for distribution after satisfaction. Creditors to agree to take no further steps in the meantime and receiver to have full authority to suspend importers preferential contracts. Italian, Span-German and American creditors ish, German and American creditors, except the San Domingo Improvement company, accept unconditionally. Belgian and French representatives will recommend acceptance. Some modus vivendi absolutely necessary. I am ready, if desired, to start to Washington on the 28th to explain the details and modifications to the plan obtainable; the whole matter can be held open during my absence. DAWSON.

"I direct that the minister express acquescence in the proposal of the government of Santo Domingo for the collection and conservation of its revenues pending the action of the United States senate upon the treaty to the end that in the meantime no change shall take place in the situation which would render useless its consummation or bring complications into its enforcement. The secretary of war of the United States will present for nomina-tion by the president of the Dominican republic men to act in the positions referred to in both the northern and southern ports. The utmost care will of course be taken to choose men of capacity and absolute integrity, who, if possible, shall have some knowledge of Spanish. All the moneys collected from both turned over to the Dominican government will be deposited in some New York bank to be designated by the secretary of war and will be there kept until the senate has acted. If the action is adverse, the money will be theu turned over to the Dominican government. If it is favorable, it will be distributed among the creditors in proportion to their just claims under the treaty. Meanwhile Mr. Hollender will thoroughly investigate these claims, including the claim of the American Improvement company, and will report in detail all the information he is able to gather as to the amount actually received by Santo Domingo, the amount of the indebtedness nom-inally incurred, the circumstances so far as they are known under which the

"This action is rendered necessary by the peculiar circumstances of the case. The treaty now before the senate was ncluded with Santo Domingo at Sano Domingo's earnest request, repeatedto Demingo's earnest request, repeatedly pressed upon us, and was submitted
to the senate because in my judgment
it was our duty to our less fortunate
neighbor to respond to her call for aid,
lnasmuch as we were the only power
who could give this aid, and inasmuch
as her need for it was very great. The
treaty is now before the senate and
has been favorably reported by the
committee on foreign relations. It is
pending and final action will undenly. pending and final action will undoubt-edly be taken when Congress convenes next fall. Meanwhile Santo Domingo has requested that the action above sullined be taken; that is, she desires in this way to maintain the statu quo, so that if the treaty is ratified it can be executed. "THEORORE ROOSEVELT." MOVEMENT AGAINST MORALES.

menace to its best interests.

It is understood that Gen. Barba

promptly reported to Washington.

The district of Monte Christi is said o be the hotbed of revolutionists in San Domingo and it was believed Barba and his associates would head for that section. Their reported arrival there consequently caused no great surprise to the Washington officials. The navy department has several vessels in Dominican waters and under direction minican waters and, under direction from the state department, if requested to do so by President Morales, will lend its co-operation in preserving the peace of the country so that its finances may be restored to a settled condition.

DENIAL BY HAYWOOD. Doesn't Expect to Replenish W. F. of M. Treasury.

Denver, March 28.—William D. Haywood, secretary-treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, emphatically denied today the statement attributed to him to the effect that he expected to replenish the treasury of that organization with contributions sent by other unions to aid the strikers in Colorado.

"The Western Federation of Miners.

"The Western Federation of Miners from July 1, 1903, up to Jan. 1, 1905," said Mr. Haywood, received from sources outside the federation the sum of \$128,628. Outside of the United Brewery Wrokers and the United Mine Workers, the American Federation of Labor contributed wars were small pro-Labor contributed a very small pro-portion of the sum named.

"We have put into relief funds in Colorado and into the distribution of them practically the whole of the amount collected, and my annual report, printed after the annual meeting of the federation board, held here port, printed after the annual meeting of the federation board, held here early in the year, gives a detailed statement of all receipts and disbursements. "President Gompers is needlessly excited over the plan to organize an international industrial union. We are merely planning a broader union than any now in existence. There are 20,000,000 wage earers in the United States. Approximately 1,500,000 are members of a union. The unions limit the number of apprentices and then refuse a man a union card unless he has served an apprenticeship. We propose to organize the workers everywhere. We are not attacking the unions formed in skilled trades. In fact, they are not eligible to membership. Ours will be an industrial union, which will include in its membership all men working in any branch of a trade or industry."

BAT MASTERSON.

Sworn in in New York as a Deputy U. S. Marshal.

New York, March 28.—William B. Masterson, known as "Bat" Masterson, was sworn in here today as a United States deputy marshal. He was recommended for the appointment by President Roosevelt. Masterson said he hoped to make a good record in his new position. Incidentally, he expressed the opinion that there is more carrying of concealed weapons in New York than in the west.

"Out where I come from," he said,
"a man does not carry a gun unless
he wants to use it. Out there the game is to leave your gun at home. Then when a fellow draws a bead on you, you can throw up your hands and show him you are unarmed. He won't shoot

him you are unarmed. He won't shoot if you do that.

"But here in New York every little sneaking son of gun who has got the price of a pistol buys one and carries it. You can't go into a restaurant or cafe in this town without seeing a dozen cheap sports with guns twisted in their hip pockets. Why, they could not get them out in an hour, and if by hard work they did manage to yank one of these toy pistols they could not hit their mark. Where there's one murder in the country I come from there's a dozen here."

BALFOUR'S FISCAL POLICY CENSURED

Vote Was Unanimously Carried In House of Commons Last Night.

MINISTERIALISTS ABSTAINED

Opposition Hoped that the Government Would Take Up the Challenge.

London, March 28 .- In the house of commons tonight a vote of censure of Premier Balfour's fiscal policy was unanimously carried, ministerialists abstaining from voting.

The session was a repetition of the session of March 22, when a resolution introduced by Mr. Ainsworth (free trade Liberal), condemning the government's proposition to impose a general duty on manufactured goods, was carried by a vote of 254 to 2. The ministerial front benches tonight were en-tirely deserted, and only about a dozen Unionists, principally free traders, were present, when Mr. Walton (Liberal), moved a resolution as follows: "In view of the declaration made by

"In view of the declaration made by the prime minister this house thinks it necessary to record its condemnation of his policy of fiscal retaliation."

The opposition had hoped that, in view of the fact that this was a vote of censure, the government would take up the challenge and would not adhere to its decared intention of ignorins fiscal resolutions of private members; but Mr. Balfour declined to be drawn out, and the opposition were driven to address denunciatory speeches to empty benches and reap the indirect benefit of the effect of the government's reof the effect of the government's re-fusal to fight when challenged.

Mr. Walton's motion was carried without a division.

At a cabinet meeting held March 21 it was decided that in future the government would not use pressure upon its followers in regard to the opposition's resolutions framed to commit the government on the fiscal question. The followers of Joseph Chamberlain took followers of Joseph Chamberlain took similar action and decided not to take part in debates or divisions on resolutions touching the tariff or fiscal ques-tions. SENOR AZPIROZ' FUNERAL. Great Respect Shown the Late

Mexican Ambassador. Washington, March 28 .- The profound regard cherished by the American gov-ernment for the late Senor Don Manuel De Azpiroz found suitable expression at a religious service in his memory held at St. Matthew's church today, which was attended by the president and Mrs. Roosevelt, members of the cabinet, the entire diplomatic corps, the supreme court, senators and members of Congress and many other officials and personal friends of the deceased

The body of the late envoy was car-ried on a caisson from the embassy in I street to the church, accompanied a military escort in command of Maj

Edward Burt.

Borne on the shoulders of eight body bearers, the casket, wrapped in the Mexican flag, was taken to the foot of the altar, followed by the members of the ambassador's family and ex-Secy. of State and Mrs. John W. Foster. Fastened to the top of the casket were the chapeau and sword of the dead envoy. The services were brief, the Rev. Father Lee officiating, and consisted of a requiem mass and several prayers for the dead.

At the close of the service the body

At the close of the service the body was removed to the calsson, followed by the honorary pallbearers, who were Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador, Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador, dean of the corps, and Baron Mayor Des Planches, the Italian ambassador; Chief Justice Fuller of the supreme court and Secy. of the Treasury Shaw; the Costa Rican minister, Mr. Calvo, and the minister from Denmark, Mr. Brun.
