# AMERICANS LEAD IN ATHLETICS

Those of This Country Sweep the Entire Field In Europe.

MANY RECORDS TO DEFEND.

When the Great Olympic Games Take Place In London This Sammer -What Has Been Done.

The eyes and thought of all the sateur athletes are turned across the Atlantic, for next summer the Olympic games will take place in London.

The first record we have of any merican athlete competing abroad is the performance of George Seward of New Haven, Conn., who went to England in 1844 and beat every man who dared run against him at all distances up to a quarter of a mile, offering long starts to any man living, beat all existing records at running short distances, at skating and at jumping on skates and finally returned to America, the acknowledged sprincing champion of the world.

champion of the world.

Deerfoot, the great Senaca Indian runner, went to Engiand in 1863, ran many races at distances near 10 miles, beat all the best English runners, and established the near record for a 12-mile run. The latter still stands as the fastest in the world. He ran in moreasins, with an awkward stride and a ribing gait, outraged all civilized ideas of training, but nevertheless was the best man of his day.

The first American amateur to compete in England was probably Richard H. Dudgeon, a New York bey, He was a genoine amateur and an enthusiastic contestant, ever ready to

thusiastic contestant, ever ready to run against anybody, on short notice, for any prize from a diamond medal to bunch of toothpicks,

a bunch of toothpicks.

The first regularly organized invasion of Great Britain by American amateurs was 1881, when L. E. Myers, Manhattan A. C., and E. E. Merrill, Union A. C., Boston, Mass., went to England and competed in several meetings, including the championships. Merrill won several races and established new English walking records at one mile and two-Meyers was beaten but once—the 100-yard championship—but won the quarter-mile championship and established a new world's record for that distance and several fresh English records for various distances.

A combination of athletes consisting of W. H. Meek, F. P. Murray, A. A. Waldron and H. Fredericks, went to England in the summer of 1884 to attend the championship meeting. Meek wen the seven-mile championship and established several new records and was unanimously voted the fastest walker ever seen in England, Myers won everything in sight, astonishing his critics and establishing new records by the wholesale.

In the summer of 1888 Great Britain was invaded by two armies of American athletes. The Manhattan Athletic club sent H. M. Banks, T. P. Coneff, C. W. V. Clark and F. Wastling, while the New York Athletic club squad included E. C. Carter, W. C. Dohm, G. P. Gray, A. A. Jordan, W. E. Koss, C. M. Smith and W. C. White Banks, White and Koos did nothing worthy of mention, Smith won twice, a running high jump and a half-mile run. Dohm was quite successful in the quarter and half-mile runs. Jordan won four firsts, including a championwon four firsts, including a champion-ship and the international race at Dub-

Gray was an easy first in every shot-putting contest he could find, winning the International championships and the international championships and beating the world's record five times in one afternoon. Clark and Coneff were also big winners, but as their birthplace was under the English flag their performances cannot very well be ac-

credited to America, Again, in 1891, the Manhattan Ath-letic club sent a team to England and

In Paris, at the international meeting, Victor Mapes of Columbia university won the long jump, while the Manhattan Athletic team took every other

A team of Yale athletes crossed the A team of Yale athletes crossed the Atlantic in 1894 and competed against Oxford university. They lost the contest by the score of 5½ to 3½. The training and management of the Yale teams were severely criticized, and were undoubtedly responsible for the failure.

In the winter of 1894-95 arrangements were made for a match between the London Athletic club and the New York Athletic club. Each club was allowed to strengthen its team by additional membership for this match, this making the affair a contest between the best English and American innateur athletes.

The result was most extraordinary.

The result was most extraordinary. The teams were fairly representative of the athletic strength of their country, and seemed likely to make a good fight, but the New York City Athlehtic club won every event. And still more wonderful is the fact that if the performances of all of New York's eleven winners had been disregarded and the score made up as if they had not been present, America would have still won the match by a score of 6 to 5.

In April, 1906, several American athletes compeled in the revived Olympian games at Athens, Greece. This delegation included no amateur champions and only one record holder, but they proved so much better than their opponents that they won almost every event entered. T. E. Little won the 100 meters and the 400 meters, with H. B. Jamison second. Curtin won the 110-meter hundle race, while H. B. Clarke took the running high jump, with R. Garrett second, Clarke, Carrett and Connolly took the first three places in the broad jump. W. W. Hoyt won the pole vault, and Connolly the hopstep and jump, and Garrett took the discust throw and shotput. The revolver and rifle shooting contests went to the two sons of General Payne, the renowned yachtsman.
