BUSINESS ON THE EXCHANGE.

Over \$197,000 Worth of Business Transacted During the Week.

YANKEE CON. STRONGER.

Sold Up to \$1.35 Today—Martha Washington Puts on a Spurt—Ajax Active—May Day Settles.

The five days' business on the Mining Exchange during the past week resulted in the sale of 365,140 shares for \$197,161.25. The sales at the afternoon call amounted to \$67,847.71, while at the morning call a total of 298,292 shares were sold for \$129,313.48. A general improvement in prices as well as in the volume of business is noticed at the close of the week. The sales today numbered 57,550 shares which brought \$29,832.87. Ajax put on a spurt yesterday afternoon on the report that a change had occurred on the 1,000 level. A denial of this report caused the stock to weaken this morning, when it was freely traded in from \$1.20 down to \$1.15. Grand Central dropped 50 shares at \$0.50 as compared with \$0.75 earlier in the week. Lower Mammoth dropped 100 shares at \$0.25. The report of a strike on the 900 level of the Centenary at which price 100 shares changed hands. Con. Mercur has shown more buoyancy this week in sympathy with the Boston market. It might have been purchased for \$3.35 on Tuesday but it has since moved up to \$3.54. May Day has remained quite firm around \$1 until today when it softened to 95¢. Showers Con., which was offered at 10¢ earlier in the week, has moved up to 14¢. West Morning Glory remains steady between 2 and 4¢. The news that the Yankee Con. had encountered the ore 50 feet lower on its dip, caused the stock to advance to \$1.35 today, though it weakened before the call closed.

STRIKE IN THE SOUTH SWANSEA

A Body of Fine Ore Exposed on the 700 Level.

MAMMOTH REPORT HAS GONE

Synopsis Telegraphed to New York Today—The Tiewaukee Strike—Yankee Con. Ore.

An important strike has been made at the South Swansea, though the management kept it quiet until it was proven to be worth talking about. The new find was made a few days ago in the drift which is being run north from the 700 level of the new shaft to connect with the old workings. The drift is on the east wall of the vein and for the past thirty-five feet or more, has been run through a body of fine ore between three and four feet wide. Indications point to greater improvement on the 800 level, as the new ore chute appears to widen at the bottom of the drift. It is not improbable that the ore will extend for some distance further north from the new shaft. The management has about 35 feet to go before connections will be made with the south drift from the old shaft. This drift was run west of the drift from the new shaft, in barren ground. It is quite probable, therefore, that the ore chute will be found paralleling the old drift further to the east, and that the present ore body will continue a considerable distance towards the old shaft. The new find gives the company 100 feet of good stopping ground and puts a few dividends in sight. Manager Wheeler says it proves that the biggest part of the mine is beneath the 700 level and as soon as the new machinery is in place, the company will resume sinking and forty gallons is being pumped per minute. The showing is also said to be very good on the 700 level south of the new shaft.

MAMMOTH REPORT.

A Synopsis Was Telegraphed to New York Today by Simon Bamberger.

The report on the Mammoth mine at Tintic was practically completed today by Expert James W. Nell. The maps will not be ready before Monday at which time they will be mailed to New York. YAMPA DEVELOPMENTS.

Machinery Nearly Ready to Drive Main Working Tunnel.

William Creig, who came in from Bingham last evening, reports everything moving along nicely at the Yampa property recently sold by Col. Wall to the Tintic Mining and Development Company. The foundation for the big compressor is nearly ready at the mouth of the main tunnel. Work was only recently started on this tunnel and it is now in about 40 feet. It is being driven on the key shaft to the south of the main shaft. The vein can be drilled on a distance of about 1800 feet. The tunnel will tap the Yampa vein from 1,000 to 1,100 feet below the surface. It is fully expected that another Highland Boy mine will be developed in this property before a great many months.

ITEMS FROM TINTIC.

Morning Glory Shaft—Lower Mammoth Extension to be Incorporated.

B. F. Woodward reports work being pushed on the new Morning Glory shaft at Diamond. It is now down about 250 feet. A whim has been taken from the old workings and installed at the new shaft, but it is said that new machinery will shortly be installed with which to secure greater depth on this promising property, which produced over \$100,000. At Jesse Knight's Rising Sun group a force of men is said to be engaged in drifting on the vein near the surface in order to determine the dip of the vein. With this decided the management expects to crosscut to a certain point in the vein from about 5,000 feet.

UTAH SCHOOL OF MINES.

Excellent Suggestions for the Establishment of the Best School.

Regarding the proposition of the board of regents of the Utah University to establish the finest School of Mines in the West, the Denver Mining Reporter says:

Utah has some important advantages in organizing its school after so many of the western states have begun, for it may avoid some mistakes and incorporate many new ideas. The Reporter suggests that the board buy at convenient locations a fissure or contact vein, a limestone deposit, a few acres of coal lands, and an iron mine. Properties of value are not required. Prospects would answer all purposes. If bought now and patented, in each case a state mine of size could be very cheaply secured. Each of these would then afford a place where the future students of the school could, in turn or during vacation, acquire under the instruction of capable foremen the practical knowledge of mining, by becoming for a time actual workmen. With all of this, the school can any one doubt that the Utah school would attract more students than any other of its kind in the world. Real mining (blasting, timbering, tracklaying, sampling, machinery installation and opera-

tion, etc.) can not be learned from books and lectures and only slowly by observation, but can be acquired and pleasantly, through practice. In time a stamp mill, concentrator, chemical plant and small smelter could be added. There would be no profit in this, but for study. If expenses were paid-as no doubt they would be, so much the better. If not, losses could hardly be great, as all labor would be contributed, and manufacturers would only be too glad to provide the state with most of the machinery required for hoisting, pumping and ore treatment. If Utah wishes to have the most celebrated and perfect mining school in the world, this plan will secure it.

TIEWAUKEE STRIKE.

The Bingham Bulletin Reports 12-inch Strake of High Grade Ore.

Of new developments in the Tiewaukee the Bingham Bulletin says it is qualified to state that results exceed all expectations, and the prediction that the old property was destined to prove a great mine is likely to be speedily fulfilled. Thirty men are now on the payroll.

Of the strike reported in Thursday's "News" the Bulletin says: An assay Wednesday on ore opened this week gave 15 per cent lead, 1.75 ounces silver and 17 ounces gold per ton. There is a 12-inch strake of this ore today, in the Blower upraise.

The Tiewaukee will today send out 50 tons of good-looking concentrates, product of 600 tons of ore treated at the Dowsy. It is in shape to deliver 100 tons daily of similar grade, but the mill is at present busy on other ore. On Tiewaukee dump there are 10 tons of extra high-grade lead, which will be shipped early in the week.

Since work began under the present management the crosscut to tap the big Caledonia vein has been driven ahead 85 feet.

The station from which the deep vertical shaft will sink is now nearly completed, and the 1,000-foot hoist to occupy it is now at tunnel mouth ready to be set up.
