This view might be adopted to meet the present situation and dispose of a the present situation and dispose of a very complex question of law. Aug. 26, 1897, William Jennings et al. petitioned the city council, repre-senting that they were desirous of form-ing a corporation to be known as the Sait Lake Telephone company, for the purpose of connecting the principal places of business, residences, offices, ets., with a district telephone system, and asking permission for themselves and run wires in and through the structs of the city for the above pur-pose.

GRICE DIES IN PRISON

Notorious Felon a Victim of Intestinal disorders-Claimed to be a Hero.

Sam Grice, a convict at the state prison, died late yesterday afternoon. In the prison hospital of intestinai troubles from which he has suffered for several months, at the age of 53. Grico came into local prominence in 1291 when he was arrested for petit lar-ceny and given 90 days in the county jall. He escaped but was recaptured by Detective Matt Rhodes. In Novem-ber, 1895, Grice turned burglar, for which he was given three years in the ber, 1895, Grice turned burglar, for which he was given three years in the state prison, but he was pardoned be-fore the completion of the sentence for "II health" caused by eating soap. In "II health" caused by eating soap. In fore the completion of the sentence for "III health" caused by eating soap. In August, 1905, Grice was given 12 years for burglary. The body was brought to town last evening, and was taken to Joseph William Taylor's morgue pre-paratory to burial. The deceased leaves a respectable family. He claimed to have won the Victoria, cross while fighting Afghans in the British service, at the age of 22; but there is no reat the age of 22; but there is no re-cord that his claim is true. But it is known that he was a native of Great ritain and did see service in the English army.
