Save Your Apples .- Now is the time, says a correspondent, to put old cloths around the trees or in the forks thereof, and the moths will deposit their larvae [therein in preference to the apples. In June, before the moths come out of their shells, destroy the cloths; or worms at least, and put cloths in the trees till September, T October, as there are two and some times three crops of worms in a year. So says Robert Mawson.
