"I do not believe you can carry New York state if you are nominated," said Mr. Ridder. "I cannot agree with you," replied Mr. Bryan, "but even though I am unable to carry that state. I believe I can be elected without the electoral yote of New York."

TALK WITH BRYAN.

Later Mr. Ridder gave out the sub-stance of his talk with the Democratic leader which lasted half an hour. Dur-ing the conference he presented to Mr. Bryan a typewritten copy of a propsed tariff on wood pulp and Mr. Bryan wrote across the bottom, "I am in favor of the above plank just the way it is." Mr. Ridder will carry this bit of paper to the convention and there is no doubt of its being inserted in the platform adopted by the convention. The plank reads as follows: "Every consideration of public pailed

reads as follows: "Every consideration of public policy suggests the conservation of our wood lands and the removal of those import duties which put a premium upon the destruction of our forests. Existing duties have given paper manufacturers a shelter behind which they have ora shelter behind which they have or ganized combinations to raise the price of pulp and of paper and to impose a tax upon knowledge. The revenues de rived from import duties on pulp am-printing paper are so small and th benefits to be obtained from the uboil tion of these duties are so considerable that we indorse the attitude of th Democratic paper and the the time of the time the second s

that we indorse the attitude of the Democratic representatives in Congress who favored the placing of pulp and printing paper on the free list." Mr. Ridder talked very plainly on the proposed resolution on the death of former President Cleveland, saying: "I think the resolution in this re-gard should be entirely devoid of any-thing ambiguous or of anything that would cause internal strife, and that the memory of Grover Cleveland should not be the subject of any quarrel. "I think undue publicity has been given the matter and do not anticipate that it will be the cause of dissension in the convention."

In the convention." Asked how Mr. Bryan took the prop-osition to withdraw from the race to the presidential nomination, Mr. Ridde said he smiled, but gave no direct re

ply, "Our talk was a most pleasant one," said Mr. Ridder. "I advised Mr. Bryan very plainly that I should go to the Denver convention opposed to his nom-ination and prepared to do all I could to oppose it. I also told him that in the event of the convention nominat-
