

MELBOURNE, 22.—Both houses of Parliament of Victoria, New South Wales and New Zealand, unanimously adopted addresses of sympathy on the occasion of the death of President Garfield.

PARIS, 23.—The American colony attended a meeting here almost en masse. There was also present many foreign celebrities, among whom was Pere Hyacinth. The communion rails, pulpit, organ loft and chairs set apart for the committee were draped with crape. The Stars and Stripes drooped sadly from the pulpit front and covered the chairman's table. After the Lord's prayer had been read, and Handel's "Angels Ever Bright and Fair," had been sung by Miss Hall, the business of the day was introduced by a few feeling remarks by Minister Morton.

Ex-Governor Hoffman addressed the meeting and then moved a series of six resolutions, giving eloquent expression to the grief of the Americans now in Paris, tendering most heartfelt condolence to President Garfield's heroic widow, thanking the great people of France for the sympathy they had shown to Americans on the present occasion, as on the occasion of the death of Washington and of Lincoln, and proposing that bearing in mind the grave responsibility of Mr. Arthur, all parties should extend to him a generous confidence.

Minister Morton then called on several distinguished citizens of the United States to address the meeting.

The first to respond was ex-Senator Cottell, who in moving accents spoke of the personal nobility of Gen. Garfield.

He was followed by Mr. James Dougherty, who, amid applause, said he trusted that all political strife and hatred might be buried in Gen. Garfield's grave.

Mr. John Jay reminded the meeting that within 20 years two Presidents had been added to the list of murdered rulers. He hoped that the successor of President Garfield would show the world, by continuing the good work which his chief had begun, that the whole policy of the nation was not to be changed by the act of an assassin.

Rev. Dr. Tyng, William Allen Butler, Gen. Meredith and one or two other gentlemen having paid tributes to the character of the martyred President, the resolutions were unanimously adopted.

The choir sang the hymn "Sleep thy last sleep," and at 6 o'clock the meeting broke up.

LONDON, 26.—The Manchester Guardian appears to day in deep mourning border.

At the various towns in England to-day, the same, even as Portsmouth, having no particular connection with America. The municipal authorities requested the inhabitants to show their respect for the late President Garfield, by closing shutters, more particularly during the funeral.

A town meeting will be held at Oldham to-night to express sympathy with Mrs. Garfield and the American People.

In London a number of firms connected with America are draped in black. All omnibus drivers are ordered by the omnibus companies to have crape on their whips. All flags on the River Thames are at half-mast, as also are those on many halls of the city.

In London to-day the signs of mourning were generally spontaneous. All agreed that there never was such a general wearing of mourning for a foreigner. Even many car and draymen have their whips draped, and in what are generally the busiest thoroughfares, such as the Strand, Fleet Street, and Cheapside, many shops and newspaper offices are partially closed. Many shops display large portraits of Garfield in the windows. Hotels display flags at half mast, and have blinds lowered. Later indications of mourning are also visible at the Royal Palaces, and at a number of private residences throughout the metropolis, and at political and private clubs.

The Pall Mall Gazette this evening says: To-day, when England and America stand as mourners by one grave, we may venture to hope that the bitter memories, the animosities engendered by the war, are finally passed away, and suggests that England and America shall endeavor to arrange some kind of an informal union for the prevention of international strife. If an European concert, despite almost insurmountable difficulties is recognized as a political necessity, why should there not be an Anglo-Ame-

rican concert, wide enough to include in one fatherland all English speaking men.

A Berlin correspondent of the Morning Post says: Dr. Von Schloesson, German Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States, takes with him to Washington autograph letters of the Emperor William and Prince Bismarck, expressing heartfelt condolence with the widow of the late President.

GULISTAN, 26.—The action between the Ameer and Ayhoob Kahn, on the 22nd inst., seems to have lasted for about three hours, when the Cabalists fired on Chaziz and Candahar in their front. This treachery decided the day. Chaziz and Candahar fled. The losses are slight on both sides, the Ameer losing 100 killed and wounded, and Ayhoob 250 killed.

The fighting between the Ameer and Ayhoob Kahn, lasted from 7 in the morning until noon.

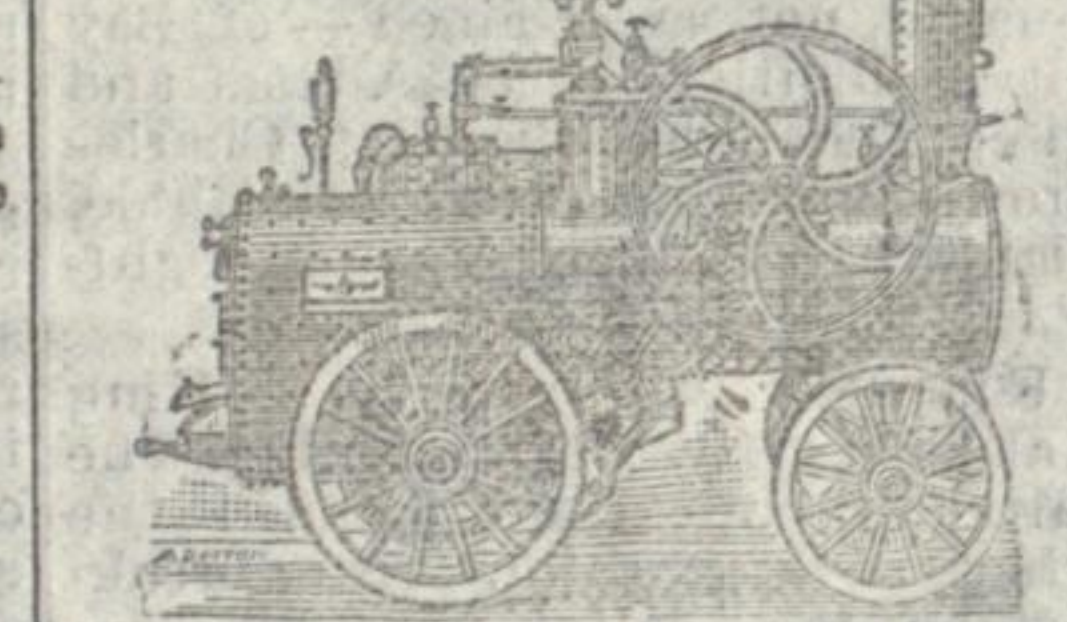
