TEN PROMINENT

Parties From Six States-None Outside Of Centennial State Have Been Taken Into Custody.

Denver, June 24 .- Ten prominent citizens of Colorado were arrested today in connection with the indictments made by the special grand jury. The charge against them is conspiracy to defraud the government under the coal

and timber laws. Those who were placed under arrest

are: John J. McMillan, conspiracy in re-gard to coal in Routt county, Colorado, in connection with what is known as the Wisconsin Coal company. Robert Forrester, chief geologist of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, con-

Robert Forrester, chief geologist of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, con-spiracy in connection with coal lands in La Plata county, and also with fraud in connection with the Calumet Fuel company, a subsidiary company to the Rio Grande railpoad.
Otis B. Spencer, formerly clerk of the district court, conspiracy in connection with the Calumet Fuel company.
F. W. Keitel, a coal operator in Rout county, Colorado, who is con-nected with a St. Louis company.
John A. Porter, formerly president of the Porter Fuel company, whose coal lands are now the property of the Southern Pacific Coal company, con-spiracy in coal lands in La Plata county, Colorado.
Edgar M. Biggs, president and John J. McGinnity and Charles D. McPhee, directors of the New Mexican Lumber compapy, fraud in timber lands in La Plata and Archuleta counties, Colorado, Alexander T. Sullenberger, president of the Pagosa Lumber company, and Charles H. Freeman of Pagosa, fraud in timber lands in Archuleta county, Colorado. a timber lands in Archuleta county, olorado. All were arraigned before United

All were arranged before United States Commissioner Sanford C. Hins-dale and heid in \$5,000 honds, with the exception of McMillan, whose bond was placed at \$2,500. The bonds were fur-nished in each case. Of the 73 persons indicted by the grand jury, 55 individuals are charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States under the coal and timber laws.

States under the coal and timber lawa. The parties come from six different states. So far no warrants have been issued for those residing in states out-side of Colorado.

Mr. McGinnity, secretary of New Mexico Lumber company, stated to-night that its officers are unaware of any fraudulent land deals and that they welcome the fullest investigation by the government. Mr. McPhee de-clared he had no interest in the com-pany during the period covered by the indictments. indictments.

The Mc Phee and McGinnity com-pany of Denver, wholesale lumber deal-ers, is in no way connected with the sults.
