

GAYNOR ATTACKS CANDIDATE HEARST

Judge Says He Was Urged to
Run for Mayor and Hearst
Pledge Him His Support.

PRETTY SORE OVER AFFAIR.

Does Not Believe People Will Submit
To His Money, Newspapers
And Power.

New York, Oct. 10.—Already enflamed by two Tammany tickets and the re-entrance of William Randolph Hearst as a candidate for mayor, the local political campaign will be marked with a record this week which will likely be maintained until election day, Nov. 2. Speechmaking will become general tomorrow night when Hearst will appear before a mass meeting in Carnegie hall to accept formally the nomination of his new party and to outline the platform upon which he will make the race.

In a statement full of sting and bite, the avowed foe of Governor William J. Gaynor, Democratic candidate for mayor of Greater New York, fired his first shot in an attack on William R. Hearst.

Last week Mr. Hearst issued a statement saying positively that he would not run for mayor, but would support Judge Gaynor. Two days later he accepted an independent nomination for the office.

GAYNOR'S STATEMENT.

Justice Gaynor tonight came out with a statement and a letter purporting to show that Hearst had urged him to run for mayor nearly six months ago "on my ticket" pledging his support. To strengthen his statement Justice Gaynor first made public a letter addressed to him by Randolph Block, who occupies an editorial position on the Hearst papers. Under the date of Oct. 5, Block said:

"While regretting exceedingly to be drawn into the affair," and "views at some length what purports to have been the details of meetings between Hearst and Gaynor early last summer. The letter said in part:

"Shortly before Mr. Hearst left for Europe last summer he asked me to bring you to his home. I think this was the second of three times you had ever seen him. He asked you if you would run for mayor in the fall and said: 'I don't care what ticket you run on, I'll support you.'"

Justice Gaynor reviews incidents which led up to Hearst's regulation of him which he described as "the most painful shock I had ever experienced," and a breach of trust such as he never encountered before.

"Meanwhile," continues the statement, "the primaries of the Independent league had been held and it was found that a decisive majority of the delegates chosen were in my favor. Thereupon Mr. Hearst would not permit the convention to be called to order. No other party ever went as far as that. It is said that this may be an indictable offense, and it is being looked into."

"After the primaries Mr. Hearst began to cry foul as usual and that his ballot boxes had been stuffed."

"No one could vote at the league primaries except its enrolled members as everyone knows. In fact, the enrollment was a mere skeleton, most of the districts having only a few on the roll and only a handful voted. And yet Mr. Hearst's statement of Mr. Hearst that Charles F. Murphy or Tammany or some one stole his primaries or stuffed his ballot boxes, seems to have been gulped down by every partisan newspaper in the city."

"The letter said in part:

"Mr. Hearst now repudiates his league party; will not permit the convention to be called to order and is having himself nominated by petition against me. I am fully conscious that his great estate of from \$10,000,000 to \$60,000,000 gives him a big advantage over me in this respect, but I am ready to meet him before the people of New York. I am ready to meet him on the campaign trail, and I am ready to meet him as a candidate for office as was never before witnessed in American politics and which, if continued, must in the end destroy our country, our politics and our system of government. But it may be that with all his money and newspapers and power, the people of New York may not let him run over me so easily as he thinks."

HEARST'S ANSWER.

Mr. Hearst gave out a statement answering Gaynor, in which he said: "If Judge Gaynor has stated that I promised to support him under any and all circumstances, and upon any and all tickets, he states what is positively untrue. I will try to assume that he is honestly mistaken, but it is difficult for me to do so, as the proposition is so unreasonable and false that it bears its repudiation on its face."

"Judge Gaynor is not a life-long friend nor a deeply loved brother to whom blind devotion might be due. He has been to me merely a representative of certain ideas, an exponent of certain principles. While he was supporting those principles I supported him. When he deserted those principles I parted from him."

Mr. Hearst denied that he invited Gaynor to come to his house. Gaynor, he said, came to his "clubby" house. He has no doubt he previously visited Murphy."

TAXPAYERS HOLDING BACK.

County Treasurer Getting Ready for The Grand Rush Next Month.

County Treasurer John A. Grovesbeck this morning said that out of a total assessment of \$2,462,000, only \$100,000 in taxes has been paid up to date. For the few days at the front of the month the office was kept busy receiving tax money, but a full has now taken place, and Treasurer Grovesbeck says that it is improbable that any considerable amount will be received between this time and Nov. 15, when the taxes become delinquent.

"People leave the payment of their taxes until almost the last thing," said Treasurer Grovesbeck, and it becomes a serious problem for the office to handle the collections when the payments come in this way. It would be a fine thing for all concerned if those having tax payments to make would get them in as early as possible. To prevent the congestion which usually takes place during the close of November, the taxes have got to be paid, and the employees of the treasurer's office would greatly appreciate it if the people would bring in their taxes early."
