In Munich owners of taxable property have a right to vote at municipal elections, but they have never gone in person to the polls, sending instead male proxies. At a recent election, however, one courageous woman, who by the way is president of a large philanthropic association, appeared in person to cast her vote. She pleaded that it was not any more difficult to cast a ballot than to instruct some one how to do it, while she was way to be sure that the right ballot was used was to cast it herself. Her action caused something of a sensation, but she was not denied the privilege she craved for. When it is remembered that until very recently women in Germany were not allowed to attend political meetings or ally themselves with political parties, and that these laws are still in effect in many parts of the empire, this action of a woman voter, which passed without protest from the men, indicates a growing sentiment in favor of the right conditions for women.

The L. L. L. party and the Social Democrats all over Germany, wherever the laws are not unfavorable, are inviting women to join them. In Hamburg about 1,100 women belong to the Social Democratic clubs, and are even represented on their boards of directors.
