## CHICAGO STREET RY. CASE.

U. S. Supreme Court Says Act of '65 Extended Charter 99 Years.

Extended Charter 99 Years. Washington, March 12.—The Chicago street railroad case, involving the ques-tion of date of termination of franchises of the lines running from the center of Chicago to the north and west sides, to-day was decided by the supreme court of the United States. The opinion was delivered by Justice Day and reversed the decision of the United States circuit court for the 'north-ern distriet of Illinois. He held that the act of the Illinois legislature of 186 had the effect of extending the charter of the railway companies for 59 years.

### PAPER TRUST CASES DECISION.

Washington, March 12-In an opinion by Justice Mokenna, the supreme court of the United States today decided the cases against the witnesses in the "paper trust" cases against the holding company that they should answer questions pro-pounded to them in the proceedings against the alleged trust suit brought by the government. The cases were dis-missed.

missed. "The cases orginated in Minnesota and Wisconsin. The Wisconsin cases were dismissed for want of jurisdiction, while, in the Minnesota cases the verdict of the court for the district of Minnesota was affirmed.
