Railway, and between this city and Grafton there was great destruction of property and loss of grain. The town of Farmington is almost submerged, water being on the first floor of nearly all the houses. There has been a number of heavy land slides, and bridges have been carried away on the Parkerburg branch of the B. & O. Railway. The loss in staves, headings, logs and barrels carried away from the vicinity of Martinsville amounts to \$100,000. All the low lands in this section are submerged and the river is now

Half a Million Damage by Flood. DAYTON, O., 3.—The rivers are beginning to fall. The small grains are all badly damaged, the tobacco used up, the potatoes rotting, and the narrow belt of corn is considerably damaged. Part of the big bridge on the Miami river south of berra was washed away lest wight. here was washed away last night; loss \$5,000. The total damage in Montgomery county to the crops and other property is estimated at half a million dollars.

LONDON, 3 .- The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the corn trade, says that the cereal crop, just reaching maturity, has been saved by the fine weather, and we may yet have a moderate harvest in good order. The up-ward movement has stopped and prices have relapsed, partly in consequence of foreign arrivals, which are annually free, but the current rates scarcely reach the average, and are still below those of last year. The harvest in France is progressing rapidly, but the general records indicate less than a fair av-

records indicate less than a fair average yield. Although in Paris and Marseilles the prices have fallen two shillings. The Belgian and German markets show a similar change. The official accounts of the crops in Austria and Hungary show that there is more likelihood of a deficiency than a surplus of a deficiency than a surplus.

Harvest came and surgrain crop was found to be a failure. However, we raised enough to pay our debt and live through winter, and then commenced borrowing again. We have sent our teams for emigrants and for poor, whenever they have desired to come here, and Saints even from Bear Lake to St. George have come here to join the Order.

At present our prospects are the most promising we have ever seen in Sevier. The fields seem almost overloaded. Our stock is in a most excellent condition, our mill and tannery are hard at work, and we

excellent condition, our mill and tannery are hard at work, and we have every prospect formaking the Order a temporal success. But that as it may please the Lord.

I have heard that the Order in other places has made fai ures on account of mismanagement. Such may be, but I can see no reason for may be, but I can see no reason for it. I have scrutinized our board of management as much as any one, but have yet failed to see the first act of selfishness in any of the directors. Joseph A. Yeung is our president, and has proved himself worthy of our entire confidence and esteem. Our work is all arranged in such a manner as to cut off the lazy from eating the proceeds of the laborer.
