

mucus in his throat, and is entirely free from pain. He asked Dr. Bliss what he thought of his condition, and the doctor replied that if he could keep down nourishment enough he would get through all right. The President then inquired how long it would be, if he should make favorable progress, before he could take trip on a steamer or go to Mentor. The doctor could not, however, give any definite period.

Executive Mansion, 21, 7.30 p.m.—Dr. Bliss just left for home. He says that the united opinion of the attending surgeons is that the vomiting which occurred this afternoon, was caused by irritation of the phlegm in the President's chest, as a result of the inflamed gland.

The *World's* Washington special says: Mrs. Garfield did not leave the White House for her daily ride. The children remained in doors. Captain Henry, who returned from Ohio, only a few days ago, is said to have gone back, and an unconfirmed rumor has it that he has gone to bring the President's mother and two young children. Should that rumor prove true it will reveal unmistakably the feeling of those who have access to the sick room.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, 22, 8.30 a.m.—The President has not vomited since yesterday afternoon, and this morning has twice asked for, and received, a small quantity of fluid nourishment by mouth. He slept more quietly during the night and this morning his general condition is more encouraging than when the last bulletin was issued. Pulse 104, temperature 98.4, respiration 18.

Executive Mansion, 9.30 a.m.—The assurances contained in the morning bulletin, that the stomach had re-asserted itself and that other indications were no less satisfactory, raised the hopes of the despondent this morning. The night, compared with the preceding one, was a comparatively quiet one. The President woke frequently, but not so often as during the night before. The accumulation of phlegm was less troublesome. About 4 a.m. the President asked for koumiss, and a small quantity was given him, which was retained by the stomach. The morning dressing showed a normal temperature and respiration, and the pulse two beats less than yesterday morning. The wound was found to be doing well, and the inflamed gland in about the same condition as last night. Dr. Reyburn said at 9 a.m.: The swelling is no worse and the general condition of the President is a little better. The anxiety is somewhat lessened by the developments of the morning but the gravity of the situation is still apparent.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, 1.45 a.m., 22.—Every thing quiet in the sick room; the doctors are all asleep, and indications are that the President is resting quietly.

Executive Mansion, 2.10 p.m.—The President is passing a quiet day and sleeps a good deal. Up to the present hour he has swallowed and retained to-day 22 ounces of liquid nourishment, consisting of milk porridge and koumiss. He has also had two enemata, one at 7 a.m. and one this afternoon. No new unfavorable symptoms have appeared, and his general condition is about the same as at 12.30.

WASHINGTON, 22.

Blaine to Lowell: The President's condition is somewhat improved since last report, he has not vomited for 21 hours. During the forenoon he swallowed liquid food several times, in all about 10 ounces. The weather is very warm but it does not affect him.

NEW YORK, 21.—The *Times* tomorrow will contain a long and interesting account of what may prove a successful attempt to recover the remains of the late A. T. Stewart. The substance of the story is given below:

Detectives from this city have, during the past week, been slowly and patiently working at a clow, which they believe may lead to the recovery of the remains of the late Alex. Turney Stewart, the stealing of which from St. Mark's church graveyard excited intense public interest and horror nearly three years ago. Under the direction of these detectives workmen yesterday began to dig up part of the ground in Oyre's Hills cemetery, in a plot belonging to John T. Runcie, work will be continued until success or failure of the effort is made apparent. The spot where the excavation is in progress was located by means of a picture which came in a singular manner into the possession of Fuller's detective bureau, the head of which with com-

petent aid has been untiringly at work. Ex-Judge Hilton has interested himself in the proceedings and yesterday sent a representative to this city to confer with Fuller.

NEW YORK, 22. The *Telegram's* Washington special says: Surgeon General Wales, of the navy, has now a case under his charge in which the blood has been vitiated in a wound received weeks before the President was shot. There was the same parotid glandular swelling, succeeded later on by an abscess. This again was followed by other abscesses to the number of 20. The pulse has varied for two months between 100 and 120. This patient has been nourished for six weeks solely upon beef extract and brandy taken in minute doses, at frequent intervals. Sometimes by enemata. Surgeon General Wales has little if any hope of final recovery in the case referred to, but thinks his patient may linger for another month, and perhaps two. He says the President, if he recovers, will need fully two months to get rid of the depravity of his blood, and during that time will suffer more than he has yet done. Gen. Wales thinks that septicaemia has been the retarding influence ever since the first incision of July 23rd.

The *Herald's* Paris private advice, received in this city, state that the explorer Stanley is lying dangerously ill half way between Stanley Pool and the mouth of the Congo. He has so little faith in his own recovery that he has made his will.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 19.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Chief Secretary for Ireland Forster, during a debate on the motion to go into supply, stated that he had made an analysis of the subscriptions to the fund of the Land League, with the following result: Total receipts this year, £10,707, of which £1,800 was from the *Irish-World*. Other American subscriptions amount to £1,543, and there were from Great Britain £81, from Ireland £162.

MARSEILLES, 19.—It now appears that the disaster attending the bull-fight here on Sunday last, resulted in the death of twenty-seven persons and the wounding of thirty.

An aeronaut, of Armatien, ascended from Montpellier on Sunday, and has not been seen or heard of. It is presumed he was lost at sea.

GENEVA, 19.—Five persons have been tried for participating in the disturbances at the recent meeting in favor of abolition of Papal guarantees. The charge against one of the prisoners was withdrawn; two others were acquitted; the other two were sentenced to six days imprisonment.

LONDON, 20.—A Berlin correspondent says: It is said that the Ultramontane leaders lately received instructions from home to support the government as much as possible, but particularly in its financial policy. Catholic journals are consequently beginning to recommend their leaders to support the Conservatives in districts where the Ultramontanes have but little chance. It appears from the quiet preparations the Socialists have been making, that they, although unlikely to return more than six members to the Reichstag, will muster sufficient strength to necessitate a number of second ballots, and failing to elect their own candidates, will be more disposed to support the conservatives than the liberals, as the former are willing to vote for Bismarck's semi-socialist ideas.

In the Commons last night during the debate on the vote for the salary for the Chief Secretary for Ireland, Parnell said he thought Forster was more detested by a large body of the Irish people than any of his predecessors on account of the mode in which he administered not only the coercion act but the general law of the country. With regard to the future he said if the land bill brought about a substantial abatement of rent, the Irish people, he thought, would make the best of it and would regard it as an instrument for the attainment of complete land reform.

In the House of Commons, to-day, Parnell, in calling attention to the arrest of Michael Davitt and moving for his release from imprisonment, said it was currently believed Davitt was arrested because he called Forster Mr. Outrage Forster in a speech. Parnell said it was the meanest and most contemptible act ever committed by any government.

Dispatches from Durban state that Zululand is still very unsettled.

BADEN, 20.—It is said a scheme has been submitted to the German Government, providing that Alsace be united with Baden, and in conjunction with that grand duchy be erected into the new kingdom of the Rhine, Lorraine to be united with a Prussian province, Rhineland, and become a part of the kingdom of Prussia. The Grand Duke of Baden expects to be the first sovereign of the new kingdom.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 20.—Telegrams received here from the consuls at Janina state the British member of the Dalmatian Convention was attacked by brigands near the frontier of Epirus, and after a sharp encounter, in which the commander of the Turkish escort was killed, the brigands were driven off.

PARIS, 20.—A dispatch received here announces the outbreak of fresh troubles at Susa. Four Europeans were reported killed and her Majesty's ship *Monarch* sent a detachment of marines ashore to protect Europeans.

LONDON, 22.—Although there will be no general amnesty of suspected in Ireland, it is stated that Father Sheely, Mr. Kettle, and about six other persons, arrested shortly after the passage of the coercion act, will be liberated before Parliament rises.
