Mr. Deering stated that both men walked alright, but the right arm of one hung limply by his side and the hand showed up white, as though he had been hurt and had lost lots of blood. SUCCESSFUL RUN OF FACTORY

Nearly Five and a Half Million Pounds Sugar to Date.

Special Correspondence. Lehi, Utah Co., Oct. 13.—In a conver-sation with Supt. J. H. Gardner he said the sugar factory had made 5,450,000 pounds of sugar up to date, and that the mill is working to its full capacity and very smoothly. The latter part of this week they will shut down for a clean-up. Many new time and labor saving machines have been introduced in the mill and among the most important is the pulp pump and the bag sewing machine. All the pulp is now pumped out into the silo instead of being taken out in the old way by cars

drawn by horses. The sewing machine has a capacity of 400 bags per hour and is a grand success as it sews the bags much better than by hand as hereto

Mr. Parley Austin, Assistant agricul-tural superintendent, reports 35,000 tons of beets received up to date. He says of beets received up to date. He says the beets are making a very fine show. The farmers are jubilant over the prospects of delivering such a fine crop. In Sanpete and Sevier counties they have just commenced harvesting and a very good tonnage is looked for. The Utah and Sait Lake counties have been digging for over a month and should digging for over a month and about \$80,000 will be distributed to the farmers of these two counties on the 15th of this month, which is the largest October beet pay day in the history of the company

tober beet pay day in the history of the company.

During the summer a 5,000 ton beet bin has been built with an elevated track and wagon road. The railroad dump cars come in now in the afternoon and are emptied in a short time and are then ready to be taken out to the farmers the next morning to be loaded, thereby saving much time and expense as well as being very satisfactory to the farmer. Farmers here have bought dump wagons and a load of 3½ tons of beets can be unloaded in about three minutes.


