

## WAS MAY WOODILL LURED TO DEATH?

Latest Theory is That She Was Taken to Eastman's Bungalow Without Knowing Place.

## IT WAS NOT HALF FINISHED.

Alleged Murderer's Body Buried Near Scene of Crime—Wife Did Not Attend Funeral.

St. Michaels, Md., June 27.—The theory that Edith May Woodill was lured to "Lame Bob" Eastman's lonely bungalow without knowledge of where she was going, and that she was drugged and detained there against her will was advanced today when a further search of the shack which the superstitious folks of the neighborhood forever more will shun as haunted, revealed a small bottle which contained a mixture of narcotic drugs. This tends to bear out the theory which the people of the community who knew and loved the girl long have wanted to believe. They never have listened to the suggestion that she was involved in a drunken orgy at the bungalow and have acknowledged the advances of the man who acknowledged his guilt by killing himself when near capture.

## EASTMAN ONLY SUSPECT.

Today's investigation led the authorities still further away from the idea that any one other than Eastman could have invited friends from New York or from any other place to visit his bungalow in the condition it was in. The place, only half completed, offered no accommodations for visitors. Whatsoever, a single bed, poorly fitted up, a table and a washstand completed its equipment of furniture. Eastman himself slept in the place infrequently.

In a grave not 50 feet from the scene of the crime, which led him to his death, Eastman's body was laid away today. The undertakers and their assistants, a little band of newspaper men and a few idle persons morbidly attracted to follow the strange funeral procession, were the only persons at the grave.

Mrs. Eastman, stopping 12 miles away, at Easton, expressed no desire to attend the funeral.

## FUNERAL AT GRAVE.

No church or church yard of vicinity would open its doors or gates to the dead man. Superstitious negroes who could not be induced to dig the grave, stood away from the outskirts of the funeral party.

When the hearse had drawn up alongside the grave, four men lifted the casket from the vehicle and placed it temporarily on two planks stretched across the grave into which a pine box had already been lowered. There was an awkward party. One of the undertakers said:

"Gentlemen, it seems to me that some one should say a little word of prayer. Won't one of you?"

His glance fell upon James Sutton, a merchant of Bozeman.

"You are a church man, Mr. Sutton," said the undertaker, "won't you say it?"

Sutton hesitated for a moment, then asking all to join with him began, to repeat the Lord's Prayer with solemn earnestness.

When the last words of the prayer were uttered, Sutton stepped forward and, filling his hands with newly turned soil from beside the grave, thrice tossed the sandy loam upon the casket as he said:

"Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."

## EVIDENCE OF MURDER.

The search of Eastman's cabin revealed further evidence of the fact that the murder was committed there. At the place where the head of the bed had rested a part of the flooring had been ripped up and new planks laid closely down. Beneath these planks the floor beam had been newly scraped with a chisel or some other sharp instrument. But the efforts to remove all

blood-stains had failed. The ground below had also absorbed a quantity of the girl's blood.

Particular search was made for any possible fragments of a champagne bottle which might tend to bear out Eastman's claim that Mrs. Woodill was murdered by another woman. Two whiskey and three wine glasses were discovered, but there were no evidences of champagne bottles ever having been in or around the shack.

## A PROLIFIC LETTER WRITER.

It is becoming apparent that Eastman was a prolific letter writer. It is said that whenever he left St. Michaels to go to Baltimore or Washington he always carried letters back here, addressed to himself as Roberts. It is claimed he also wrote to Postmaster Taylor the letter signed "E. B. Wellington," which the postmaster what a fine fellow Roberts was and how much he (Wellington), an uncle living in Denver was interested in him. The writer asked that Roberts be considered treated.

Atty. A. S. Rosenthal of New York, who is here as a former lawyer for Eastman, and as the representative of persons who lost heavily in suits on Eastman's bond when he fled from New York, declared today that he would endeavor to have the bondsmen discharged on proof of Eastman's death and thus relieve the sureties.

The local police have tried to communicate with Dist. Atty. Jerome as to the status of the New York reward offered for Eastman.

There still exists a strong belief among several members of the coroner's jury that others than Eastman and Mrs. Woodill were in the bungalow at the time of the murder.

It was even hinted tonight that one or more arrests may be made at any time.

It was further intimated that the arrest would not be made at St. Michaels or at Baltimore.

Mrs. Eastman, widow of the accused murder, has not changed her opinion since coming to Easton, that her husband did not kill Mrs. Woodill. She declared today that Eastman had told her he was a fugitive from justice and that he would rather commit suicide than serve 20 years in the penitentiary on the charge of grand larceny.

Mrs. Eastman says she had given the stage to earn a living for herself and little boy.

## HASKELL INDIANS TO PRESENT "HIAWATHA"

Denver, June 27.—Forty-five Indian from Haskell Institute, Lawrence, Kan. will come to Denver this week to present the play "Hiawatha" before delegates to the National Educational association, which will begin its annual convention here July 5.

The play also will be given in connection with the National Indian congress, which also will begin July 5. Two free performances will be given in the big Denver auditorium for delegates to both conventions.

A feature of the Indian congress will be a tuberculosis exhibit, showing actual conditions in Indian homes and others showing sanitary conditions. More than 50 per cent of deaths among Indians are due to this disease.

Prof. Irwin Shepard, permanent secretary of the National Educational association, announced today that all appointments for the final program have been accepted. He predicted that there will be at least 10,000 to 12,000 educators at the convention, and probably many more. Preparations are almost complete for the various sections, most of which will meet in churches. The program for the Indian congress, as announced today, includes addresses by leading educators in Indian schools. There will be exhibits from Indian schools, with classes of Indian pupils. Only a few speakers on the N. E. A. program have been announced.

## THE FATAL KISS.

Pittsburg, June 27.—In her anxiety to kiss her husband farewell, at the Charleston station, Mrs. Marie Antonio of California today neglected to take the car window into account and thrust her head through the glass. She was severely pushed on the neck and is not expected to survive.

## TEN MILLION DOLLARS IN GOLD MOVED

San Francisco, June 28.—Early this morning a dray loaded with \$10,000,000 in gold coin was driven down Market street in this city from the temporary quarters of the city treasury in the California Safe Deposit & Trust company building to the vaults in the old city hall. Fourteen of the finest truck horses that could be secured drew the valuable load and 20 mounted policemen guarded the caravan. John F. McDougall, city treasurer, occupied the seat beside the driver. The east wing of the old city hall where the vaults are located is the only part of the building left by the wreckers, who have made a thorough job of the work started by the earthquake and fire of 1906.

## CATHOLIC WAR ON LIQUOR TRADE

Appeal Made to Every Member of The Church in Illinois to Join In the Fight.

## WOULD MAKE THE STATE DRY.

Campaign Undertaken by Catholic Total Abstinence Association, Backed By Archbishop Quigley.

Chicago, June 28.—Warfare has been declared by Roman Catholic temperance advocates against the liquor traffic. A call to every member of the Catholic church in Illinois to join in the fight for a "dry state," denunciation of Catholic societies which tolerate the sale of intoxicants at picnics and Saturday night dances, and an appeal for a rigid enforcement of the Sunday closing law are contained in the resolutions adopted yesterday by the Catholic Total Abstinence association of Illinois.

Backed by Archbishop Quigley, the movement has enlisted many Catholic ministers and plans are on foot to establish in each parish from Chicago to Carle concrete organizations to battle against the liquor industry.

Preceding the national convention of the organization to be held here Aug. 4, 5 and 6, Catholics of Chicago will hold a monster parade through the downtown streets in which it is expected 10,000 total abstinence supporters will participate.

## WALTER WELLMAN WILL TRY, TRY AGAIN

Tromsø, Norway, June 27.—The steamer Arctic, of Walter Wellman's North Pole expedition, arrived here today from Spitzbergen, with her flags at half-mast, bringing the news that Knud Johnson, one of the two men who remained at the Wellman camp this winter, had perished in the pack ice and that the ship had been destroyed by a heavy storm.

If it is found impossible to make the voyage northward this summer, Mr. Wellman declares he will continue as long as it is necessary, to attain success.
